# Letter to the fellowship

Our Minister, Sohail, was away during the end of April on church business and was therefore unable to write his usual "Letter to the fellowship". Therefore, your Editors hope that this article borrowed from another Church's monthly magazine will fill that spiritual "gap".

### **Never Far Away**



We can only imagine how the two travellers to Emmaus felt knowing that Jesus had died. Gone were their hopes for a bright future. They thought God had let them down. They had suffered a cruel blow and were bewildered and upset.

In their grief, the risen Jesus came alongside them and spoke with them at

length but somehow they didn't recognise Him. Why was this, and why did Jesus intend to leave them at Emmaus without first revealing who He was?

The answers may be found by looking back at the encounters Jesus had with people. He never forced His true nature onto anyone. Every individual had to make up their own mind as to who He was, and to decide if the things He said were true.

Today, Jesus does not 'gate-crash' into our lives. In a number of ways He gently and persuasively reveals Himself. So, the story of the walk to Emmaus should encourage us each time we feel His absence; at those times when we thought He would step in and immediately solve our problems! On *our* journey of life, we can have times of sadness and it can seem as though God is far away. But while we are thinking that Jesus has left us alone, He is actually with us. He knows where we are and what we are feeling. He can quietly draw alongside us. Surprisingly, it can sometimes be in situations of sadness and solitude that Jesus 'speaks' to us more clearly.

He is present in the here and now. Jesus is the unseen companion on every journey and the unseen guest at every meal. In His way and in His time, our Lord reveals Himself to us in different situations. We may be aware of His presence in surprising circumstances and on unexpected occasions. How important it is that we stay alert.

There will be times when we will be like those two men on the Emmaus Road, search for answers. We will earnestly desire clear and direct answers to our questions and the knowledge, understanding or revelation may be slow to come. But, with Jesus, there are many lessons to be learnt along *our* Emmaus Road than would have been discovered any other way.

# News from the Forum (2<sup>nd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday each month)

As we come to the end of April we can report on another interesting month at the Christian Forum which meets on the second and fourth Tuesday afternoons each month in the Foyer @ 2.30pm. All are welcome to join us at any of our meetings which take a very varied format.

This month we have had two contrasting meetings. The first one, on the 11<sup>th</sup> of April was arranged for us by one of our own number, Shelagh Root. Whenever Shelagh sets us a Quiz you can guarantee that you will have to think quite hard to attempt the answers, whilst in the background Shelagh offers such encouragement



as "It's really easy you know". That may be so and usually when she gives us the answers it all becomes magically clear and you wonder why you couldn't think about it at the time!!

OK, so test yourselves with a couple of examples from the last one:

I wonder if those of us who did it can remember what they were?

I meet in a group regularly, where the leader also runs a quizzing group and she was very impressed with the thinking that Shelagh had put into the Quiz we had. Thank you Shelagh for an entertaining afternoon.

Then on the 25<sup>th</sup> of April we had a visit from John Amos, always a lovely man to meet with and a very good, clear speaker. The latter is very important to a group where hearing aids are very much part of life. John has been a Street Pastor in Southend now for just over a year and he gave us a good insight into the whys and wherefores of being in that role.

He told us that their start time on a Friday and Saturday night down in the heart of the club scene in Southend is 10.00 pm and an early return home is around 2.30 am. More often they are still out on the street until 4.00 am dealing with teenagers who have lived the high life a bit too vigorously and John said that the team give out any number of flip flops! Why? Because these young girls start out in extremely high heeled shoes but by the end of the night they are carrying them and walking in the streets in bare feet.

They also watch over the rough sleepers and we were to hear that often these men and women are there because they want to be, not because they are destitute. John told us that the pastors do not try to influence people's life styles but really act as befrienders just to let folk know that someone cares. He told us that in the early days of training one would-be pastor was asked why she was doing it and her reply was just that "to show I care and if Jesus was here today he would be doing it"

What more is there to say except Thank you John, and we look forward to a return visit.

#### Peter's Piece - Praying Together.

This third 'thoughts on prayer' concerns praying together.

We do, of course, pray together as we are led in prayer during the course of a service. When, we no doubt, listening, confirm with our hearts and minds, the prayers being expressed, make them our

own, so we truly mean our Amen said aloud, at the end. But we seldom have the opportunity to join in by praying aloud for the concerns on our minds; in a service of public worship it is difficult and not necessarily appropriate to accommodate this; we can however always pray in the quietness of our own hearts, during a silent pause or at the conclusion of the formal service, while the voluntary is being played and before all rise from their seats with all sorts of unrelated conversations beginning.

It seems the very early Christians met for the specific purpose of prayer, Acts 2:42. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer.

Praying together is one of the four foundation activities of a Church fellowship - learning from God's Word together, having fellowship with one another together, celebrating Holy Communion together and praying together. We need, as a Church, all four!



Later in Acts we see that prayer was not only part of the other three activities but, especially as need arose, just meeting for prayer. For example when Peter was imprisoned, whilst Peter was kept in prison, the church was earnestly praying to God for him. Read the account in Acts 12:1-19 and see the answer God gave to their praying, it was beyond their belief!

Meeting together, primarily to pray, is a life line activity of the church fellowship when we can spend that time praying for the fellowship, our families, Southend and the world - we too might be astounded at the answers God would give!

The opportunity is there every Tuesday morning at 10.00 am. We commence by letting God's Word prepare our hearts and minds and then sharing together and praying together: the sharing together is part of praying together! Anyone is free, as they feel prompted, to lead by praying aloud but there is no expectation for anyone to pray aloud, just the opportunity; come and pray, even by just praying in the quietness of your own heart.

Perhaps if we followed the example of the early Church and as a Church not only meet for learning, fellowship and Communion but also for prayer we too might be surprised by God's answering?

#### Knitting and crocheting for Greenbelt

You may have heard that many of the Crafters that meet on a Tuesday have been busy knitting food. I thought it might be an idea to share with you what this is all about.

For its second year, The United Reformed Church is an associate partner of Greenbelt,



the Christian Arts festival which takes place at Boughton House, Northamptonshire, over the August Bank Holiday. Last year we had a very successful festival around the title of 'Scrap the Church?' There was a large art installation, panel discussion, discussion sessions with younger festival goers and 'Pop Up Liturgies'. One of the more successful activities was the treasure hunt arranged for families who had to find a star, each decorated by our thirteen Synods.

As part of this year's theme of 'More Than Welcome' and using the story of the great banquet, we are preparing a knitted food themed treasure hunt. The hunt will take festival goers to hampers dotted around the site. They will answer questions on food/feast stories from the Bible and collect various knitted food items. They will then be asked to add the fruit to an empty banqueting area in the URC tent so that over the course of the weekend the area goes from being empty to abundant. New this year will be a knit/pompom make and natter area where conversations on how the church can be more welcoming can develop in a non-threatening way. There will also be street theatre and a range of speakers in the tent.

On the last day of the festival, volunteers will head out into the crowds to distribute the knitted food. An attached postcard will let

people know that it is a gift from the URC to remind them of Greenbelt, and will include a food for thought/challenge to take away with them as well as a list of where to find useful resources on the theme of 'More than Welcome'.

A real strength of last year's URC presence was the fact that the Synods had been involved by decorating the stars so, with that in mind, we thought it would be great to get as many URCs involved with knitting the food as possible. Already we have over 50 signed up. We have heard of small churches being involved in a national project for the first time and of a group setup for those living with dementia who have found great joy in knitting simple items. The 'More than Welcome' is already working amongst congregations.

I know many at Crafters are busy knitting, so a very big thank you from the Greenbelt planning group for your part in this. It will be a great weekend filled with worship, challenges and fun.

On a separate note: Commitment for Life is 25 years old this year and there are special events happening throughout the year. One of these is a visit, in May, to Christian Aid partners in Zimbabwe. Both I and the supporters group would appreciate prayers as we see how the money raised by Commitment for Life is used and hear many inspirational stories. I am sure I will share my experiences during our annual CforL service in October.
