Letter to the fellowship



At our minister's get-together last month, our topic was "Worship, Mission and Discipleship." We looked at ourselves being the disciples and our role as leading others to become the disciples of Jesus Christ.

We also looked at being the Salt and the Light of the world. Jesus didn't say that you can be or you have the potential to be the salt and light but he meant that everyone who has put his/her trust in Jesus Christ has no option but to play that role.

Salt may not have much value in today's world, but we cannot underestimate the value it had in the ancient world. In the ancient Near East, salt was a precious and valuable commodity. It was used for many purposes including as a preservative, for seasoning (Col 4:6), and for purifying (2Kgs 2: 19 -22). It was also used to pay Roman soldiers their wages, considered divine by the Greek.

What are the characteristics of salt that caused the Lord to use it in this context? There are different theories about the meaning of "salt" in Matthew 5:13. Some think that its whiteness represents the purity of the justified believer. Others say that salt's flavouring properties imply that Christians are to add divine flavour to the world. Still others believe that Christians are to sting the world with rebuke and judgment the way salt stings an open wound. Another group asserts that, as salt, Christians are to create a thirst for Christ. Salt, however, has another vital purpose which is probably what the Lord had in mind - it stops decay. When Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth", He meant that all of His disciples were to serve as preservatives, stopping the moral decay in our sin infected world.

I wonder how we see ourselves fitting in any of these roles. Remember, the warning Jesus gives us in Matthew 5:13 *"But if salt loses its taste, how would its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, except to be thrown out and trodden underfoot by men"*.

The loss of saltiness occurs in the failure of the Christian to daily take up the cross and follow Christ wholeheartedly. On the other

hand, the status of salt is something which follows naturally from the Christian's humble obedience to the commandments of Christ.

Let us continue to examine ourselves so we may humbly and wholeheartedly follow him, not only ourselves but also encourage others to do the same.

Amen.

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
SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

It has certainly been a busy two months, both at home and at Church.

In our garden and greenhouse cucumbers, courgettes and tomatoes have been prolific and I have been glad to give them away. As I write there are still some coming along but the cooler weather has slowed things down a bit (except the weeds of course). We are continuing to remodel our garden, and are planning a terraced planting area, utilising the bricks and paving slabs that were removed from the front when that was done; and hopefully a new shed for the accumulation of bicycles. There is some work to do indoors too so we won't be slacking over the winter!

Our grandson Frank has reached the ripe old age of 7 and enjoyed celebrating on a pirate theme, and we are delighted to say we will be grandparents again in January, a little girl this time.

There were various items of work carried out on the church premises over the summer: the annual boiler and air handling system service, with some adjustments to make it a little cooler in the worship area; cleaning of the church projector; enhancements to the CCTV - with appropriate signage - which we hope will reduce the number of padlocks lost to break-ins; and the new outside screen which you can actually read in daylight. As well as these professional works, the Property Management Group carries out regular refurbishments and repairs and we are grateful to everyone who helps with this.



We had two successful Fun Days during August. A lot of work is involved but our families so enjoy a wholesome activity that doesn't come with a huge price tag, it is well worth the effort, Thank you to everyone who prepared craft and games, turned up on the day to help, and cleared up afterwards!

We have had quite a variety of worship over the last two months. Messy Church in August was on the theme of the Lord's Prayer and, to avoid a change in mind-set, the following Sunday service was on the same theme, with participation from members of the Boys' and Girls' Brigades from Belfast. A very familiar passage, which we sometimes rattle off without too much thought is worth a deeper exploration from time to time and I hope you found it useful.

Our Minister, Sohail led our worship on 13th August and on 20th we welcomed Rev. Trevor Williams - we sung some of his favourite hymns and were reminded that not all churches are blessed with musicians. On 27th August it was the turn of our own Roger Brett to challenge us to own up to the things we are good at, all of which contribute to the life and witness of the church. 



Peter's Piece - The Sermon



Having considered a number of the elements of Morning Worship there are still a few remaining to think about, 'the Sermon,' this month; 'the Order of our Worship Service' in November issue; and in the New Year 'the Lord's Supper or Holy Communion'.

The Sermon is not the time for a quiet snooze! As we shall see next time as we look at the Order of our Worship Service there is both structure, purpose, order and movement as we join together to Worship the One true God who is both Creator and Redeemer.

We Worship, that is bring him our praise and adoration because of who he is and because of who he is as we worship, we want to hear what he wants to say to us. During the course of the Service, God may speak to us in numerous ways, if we are listening for him to speak, through the words of a hymn or prayer, in the reading of his Word the Bible, and through the message God has given the speaker in their preparation. If we are not concentrating we won't hear! We need to stay alert and listen. *'Wake up, sleeper rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.'* Ephesians 5:14

What God has to say to me may very well not be the same as to other members of the congregation; but on occasions God may well be speaking to His church here at the Cornerstone as a whole. We need to pay attention and hear, when he does.

Most of our worship leaders/speakers use the Revised Common Lectionary, see my piece in the May 2016 issue of New Horizons, as a guide to what passages of scripture to use as the theme for each Sunday's considerations. You may find it a help to your concentration on the Sermon if you have acquainted yourself with the appropriate passages before the Service. To this end I will put the RCL readings for the following month at the end of my piece each month. Even if the speaker for a particular Sunday does not use the RCL at least the fellowship will have read in common those

passages of scripture and opened their minds to God's leading before the Service.

If the speaker does use the RCL we will be prepared and find help in their expounding passages already familiar to us.

May God bless us and use us as, we together, consider his Word through the agency of his servant the speaker, in the Sermon.


