<u>Letter to the fellowship - Advent, a time to switch gears</u>



It's that time of year again -- Advent. It's always tempting to skip over Advent and jump right into the euphoria of Christmas Day -- after all, the rest of the UK and probably the world began gorging itself on Christmas delicacies in October. But, I believe something is lost when we rush

through the beautiful, reflective season of Advent.

One of my favourite elements of Advent is its dual purpose -- it's not just a liturgical season carved out for pondering over the days before Christ, but a time set aside to anticipate Christ's second, glorious coming. Like the ancient Israelites we wait in anticipation of an event we can only dimly imagine -- an event where all that is right, good, and truthful will come to fruition in His perfect timing.

It is impossible to have this high level of watching and waiting every day of our lives. For this reason, the church brings us the season of Advent. It is, in effect, a time when the church sits on the front porch eagerly longing for the coming of the Lord.

There are many people who take the Christmas story for granted, even among Christians. Our ears have become numb as we've heard the story countless times and in varied settings -- the angel's appearance to Mary, Joseph's dream, the road to Bethlehem, the lack of room in the inn, the birth in a lowly stable, the appearance of nearby shepherds.

The Nativity has acquired a certain peculiarity in Western culture -something to smile at while we bustle about decorated shops trying to check every name off our lists. Yet, when we take time to prepare for this moment in salvation history, to reflect on the events leading up to the birth of Jesus Christ, a sense of awe returns.

Advent is a time to switch gears, we must stay alert and watch, for Jesus is coming. We don't want to be caught napping.

Below is a real life "Good Samaritan" story from a former member, Julia Ware, who now lives in Canada. She says:

I haven't written anything for the Church Magazine for quite some time but I heard of something this week which really tugged at my heart strings and I think it will with you too.

Since moving out here to Canada, we have met an English family whose daughter works as a waitress at a traditional English tea room in a tiny village near to our house. Recently the tearoom took on a girl in her 20's to become the dishwasher



Knowing that the girl had to take two bus journeys home every day, Olivia, the waitress, offered to drive her home one night. She dropped the girl at her tiny apartment and was invited in. Olivia was met with the surprise of her life when she saw how the polite, quiet girl was living. There was hardly any food in the cupboards - they literally were bare and when she went into the bedroom, there were no blankets or covers on her bed. When Olivia asked where the covers were, she said she slept in her clothes and used her coat as a cover.

Olivia went home but couldn't turn her back on what she had witnessed. Apparently the girl was one of seven and has learning difficulties and her parents live in Vancouver about one hour away. They were unable to care for the children and the girl remembered living in a tent with them when she was younger.

The following day, Olivia took the girl to the supermarket and bought her some essentials and realised that the girl didn't really know how to cook properly, as she had never been shown. She had been eating what she could. Then she had to move from her rental apartment and until she could move to the next one, she had nowhere to go so Olivia and her family took her in for two weeks.

They were amazed at the state of her clothes and underwear so they went and bought her some more essentials from Walmart as well as a new work outfit.

When her next apartment became available, Olivia and her Mum helped her scrub it clean then helped her to move in. They helped her out with getting some more essentials and Olivia went round and showed the girl how to cook certain things.

Recently, she turned up at work and was walking badly. Olivia asked if she was ok and she said someone had given her some shoes which were three sizes too small but it's all she had. After work, Olivia went to Walmart and bought her some basic robust work shoes - in the right size

The tea room staff hold a 'Secret Santa' every year and Olivia suggested that this year, they all put their \$20 together and buy a coat for the girl. The other staff weren't too keen at the idea but Olivia said that surely they could all get by without extra toiletries etc.

Olivia's Mum said that by this girl coming into their lives, it has changed Olivia as a person, seeing first-hand how others live.

We all know this kind of poverty goes on everywhere but hearing this really upset me. Who knows what the future will hold for the girl and Olivia will find it hard to walk away from getting so involved in the situation, but both their lives have become richer because of it.

BELONGING

Back in 2012 I became the latest member to join a club that I hoped not to join for some time. I became a member of the 'Newly Retired Club'. This club is otherwise known as the 'Oh! Now you are retired you have lots of time to help out with (insert organisation of choice) Club'.

When I was in the Air Force I always tried to join the library if there was one, the Scout Group if there was one and attend the church if there was one. I needed to feel that I belonged even if RAF churches did not seem to have a formal 'Membership' requirement.

But all the time I was in the Air Force I belonged to God's church in Westcliff having started in Sunday School, becoming an irregular attender at services and finally accepted to full membership in 1963.

But more importantly for all of my time I have belonged to God. I was His from the day I was born whether I was at Sunday School or not, at Youth Club or not, a Full Church Member or not, whether I only came for worship on a Sunday, whether I only came for worship on the first Tuesday of the month or even if I rarely walked through the door of His church. I belong to Him.

Many of us will have made a Declaration of Faith and know we have formally joined The Cornerstone United Reformed Church and also the wider United Reformed Church. As Members we are part of the 56,086 United Reformed Church Members with Membership responsibilities.

But all of us at The Cornerstone Full Members, those who have not taken this formal step, those who belong to the large number of worshippers on a Sunday or another day of the week or are attendees at other Church supported activities all belong to God and have chosen to come along to His Church, The Cornerstone, and feel that we 'Belong' here.

All of us are part of, and "belong" to, many things - families, clubs and societies, and belonging means responsibility. As people who come to the Cornerstone, who feel we belong here, depending upon our roles, we accept a smaller or greater responsibility for what

happens here. Wherever we are on that 'Belonging' path we all know that a great amount of work goes into providing what we have here at The Cornerstone.

Next February we will be looking at 'Belonging', how people who 'Belong' give to God and His Church - not just financially, but also of their time and talents - what we often refer to as Stewardship; and importantly how Stewardship asks us to consider our giving.

Stewardship acknowledges that we 'Belong' to God and that everything we have first comes from God and then poses the question 'How do we respond and use the gifts that He has given us?'

How we can give of our gifts locally in support of our church family, the wider community and in support of the work of the national and international church.

And through other activities we will look at our responsibility to grow in Christ and that growth may change our lives, our priorities and our church life making us think about 'Belonging' more.

Belonging to God is not membership, it's not going to church on Sunday, it is walking with Christ every day.

To help us think about where we 'Belong' we will be running three different events.

7th February: A Belonging themed Messy Church 12th February: A Belonging themed morning service.

15th February: A Belonging themed Church Family Event: 4-6 pm Open evening for all related groups and Sunday congregation, for everyone to share a little of what they do each week; adapted presentation, with a meal, open to families from Pilots, Scouts, Parent & Toddler, Preschool and Messy Church.

Please try to attend and see how you belong: To your organisation, to The Cornerstone and to God.

Peter's Piece

Incarnation

Sorry about the technical word but it is frequently used at this time of the year and I felt it could be helpful for us to take a look at it and see what we can discover. Here I have an impossible task because it is a vast subject and

I have the limitations of only a paragraph or two.

Literally the word, derived from the Latin, means 'made flesh'. When addressed at Christmas time to Jesus it means we acknowledge that He the promised Messiah (Christ), God the Son was born of the Virgin Mary¹ as a human being, God himself became flesh, a Man, the Son of Man. Fully God and at the same time fully Man². Colossians 2:9 For in Christ [the Messiah] all the fullness of the Deity [God] lives in bodily form.

I am sorry for the homework, looking up the references, and perhaps my seeming to labour the point but the Incarnation is amazingly and wondrously true and it is vital that we grasp something of the implications of this glorious truth.

I have just finished reading N T Wright's excellent book 'The Challenge of Jesus. NE' £13 Amazon, which I can thoroughly recommend. In it Tom Wright poses the question - in what way did Jesus 'know' he was God incarnate? In the answer, he suggests that Jesus didn't know he was God in the kind of certain knowledge that mathematical truths are known; nor as observational truths, like facts of our bodies, tall, short, thin, fat, hungry, thirsty. It was rather the kind of knowledge which assures us of the affection of our loved ones, or of a vocational knowledge: Like someone 'called' to be a doctor, a missionary, or a Minister! He was responding to an inner conviction that He was God, so He had to live out by faith that belief: strengthened in prayer³, challenged by temptation⁴, anguished over

in further prayer and doubt⁵ and then put into action⁶. Jesus in his earthly life, like we should, lived by faith; it wasn't instinctive. Choices had to be made.


Jesus truly had to face life as we do; he didn't have the divine powers and knowledge in an automatic way. He couldn't do right simply because he was God; he had to live out his belief that as God the Man Jesus would have to be all that the scriptures proclaimed is YAHWEH. No one has ever seen God, but the one and only Son, --- has made him known. John 1:18.

As Christians, by faith we 'know' that through God's grace our sins are forgiven and that we are *children of God.* With then this example of Jesus before us, may we too find the Holy Spirit's strengthening power this Christmas and New Year in our wrestle of living the life as children of God.

Advent Journey - By David Coaker who works for the URC

In the coming weeks, we travel the road to Bethlehem anew. We shall share in Christingle, parade, nativity and carol services. Sing the familiar carols. Watch the flickering candles, twinkling lights, decorations, presents, Christmas trees, smiles on children's faces, and await the child in the manger. We explore the stories of Jesus' birth, and the message they offer for our world today.

We reflect with Matthew the dilemma of a man who discovers his fiancée is pregnant and prepares to quietly break from her, until an angel intervenes. After the child is born we hear of travellers from the east following a star, their misstep in visiting the local despot, their gifts of money, incense and perfume, and their change of travel plans. We fear for the family as they flee as refugees to the land of an ancient enemy, narrowly avoiding the genocide of the children of their town.

We ponder with Luke who tells us of a family drama of a young girl speaking to an angel, an elderly couple becoming parents, cousins communicating whilst in their mothers' wombs, an empire used to draw God's chosen to Bethlehem for a census, and a birth in a stable that was welcomed by a choir of angels and drew shepherds to share the fire.

We have our spirits drawn to God with John, who poetically combines the creation of the universe with Jesus' birth and the message he shared.

We are reminded that all of these are inspired by the ministry of Jesus and the Resurrection experience of his followers, as Mark ignores his birth and begins his story with Jesus' baptism and the heavenly declaration: "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

We travel the road to Bethlehem anew. The road has many turns and junctions, but all get us to the reality of a birth. The beginning of a life that changed the world and changes lives, a life that invites us to live it too. A life that we are called to declare, live and embrace. A life that draws everyone into the journey of living God's dream
