

Letter to the fellowship - Celebrating Lent



Can we truly recognize the glory of Easter Sunday without understanding what led to the misery of Good Friday?

days of Lent were time for pause, а contemplation, rededication and reflecting on Jesus' 40 days in the wilderness and final journey to the cross. They used this period as a special time to contemplate Christ's life, examine their own lives and rededicate themselves to faithful service. They used it as a way to pause from the monotony of daily life and to refocus on God.

Easter Sunday historically brought joy - new believers took baptismal vows while others renewed their promises - but Lent involved deliberate searching, fasting, prayer and confession. The sacrifices of the season led into the unparalleled high of Easter morning - the glory of resurrection and liberating promise of salvation.

In these days of instant gratification, the temptation is to skip the tribulations and move directly into the triumph. But theologians like Augustine preached patience: "After the days of this humiliation will be the time of our exaltation, ... Therefore, let us voice our lamentations more insistently in prayers; then we shall exult more exuberantly in praise."

Easter truly is an astonishing thing - the pain of betrayal, the agony of crucifixion and the utter ecstasy of resurrection. But wait. While Easter events provide the core of our salvation, there is so much more to Jesus' ministry than those final three days. There is struggle and tension. There are parables and lessons. And there are miracles and wonders enough to eternally sate our thirst for the divine.

And there is waiting. For some in Jesus' day, the waiting was for vindication and victory. Others waited for a lifeline out of hopelessness and despair. Christ brought all of those things, but in a way that, despite his warnings, none of his followers expected.

In John 9:30, the formerly blind man acknowledged the "astonishing" or "marvellous" thing that had been done to heal his sight. During Lent, we, together, can reopen our own eyes to the astonishing things that Christ has brought to the world.

Peter's Piece - Prayer 2

A life of prayer

The week before going into hospital I had a brain storm and decided to tidy up a cupboard that holds over 100 of my books. Unfortunately two of the shelves had collapsed, the small

plastic angle shelf supports having given way under the strain! As in tidying out any space it is easy to become side-tracked by discovering things forgotten, which give a renewal of the pleasures and information that had once been so delightful or compelling but had faded with the passing of time.

Such was the rediscovery of a small book, written in the mid 17th century, of conversations and letters of Brother Lawrence, a friar of the Carmelite Order, who was just a humble worker in the kitchen of the monastery. The book records his 'Practice of the presence of God' so that he was able to say "The time of business does not with me differ from the time of prayer; and in the noise and clutter of my kitchen, while several persons are at the same time calling for different things, I possess God in as greater tranquillity as if I were upon my knees at the Blessed Sacrament."

In our thoughts about prayer I would like to recommend this small, yet powerful volume for your consideration as part of your Lenten reading, as we, customarily during this time, strive to reassess and with God's help improve our Christian living.

We can't of course improve our being a Christian, for by faith in Jesus we are made perfect not by our works but by God's Grace but we can, until that great Day of the Resurrection, *make every effort* to improve our Christian living. 2 Peter 1:10 NIV *Therefore, my brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election.* - Live in accordance with your being a Christian: or as Paul puts it, Philippians 2:12 *continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling,*.

Ash Wednesday, March 1st, was the beginning of Lent, the 40 day period that takes us up to Holy Week and then to Easter.

Look out for Prayer 3 - Praying Together, coming after Easter D.V.

May God bless us this Lent as we review our lives as Christians.


