Responding to God

You must have heard these questions again and again; "Is God still speaking? If God is still speaking, how does he do that? How do/should we human beings respond to it?

There are a number of examples, evidences in the Bible where God directly or indirectly spoke to people. Through angels, animals, dreams, visions, symbolic actions, a gentle whisper, miraculous signs and of course directly himself.

Hebrews 1: 1 - 2 says, "In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, ² but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe".

While on the road to Damascus, Jesus appeared to Saul, blinded him and directed him to go to Damascus. There, God spoke to Ananias of Saul and told to lay hands on this troubled man. Ananias did as he commanded and Saul was filled with the Holy Spirit, healed of his blindness and immediately baptized.

In another instance, while Cornelius was praying, God sent an angel to tell him "Go and find Peter and he shall tell you what you need to do." Acts 10. Cornelius, along with his household and friends, did what he commanded, and God used Peter to bring them all into the Kingdom!

God could have easily brought both Saul and Cornelius into the Kingdom without the intervention of any believer - but that was not his plan. He used Ananias, Peter and countless others to finish what He had already started!

In the same way, God wants to include us in his plans! He has been speaking to people in our families, neighbourhoods, offices and everywhere else we go! He has been drawing them gently and He wants us to be a part of their salvation!

Ask God for a fresh filling every day, and he will prepare our hearts to hear God's voice. His Spirit, that still, small voice inside us, is the One who will remind us of what God said, and help us recognize God's opportunities in our lives. Let's start listening to his voice let's be open to hearing His direction; for ourselves and others around us!

This month we heard about the two ends of our age spectrum at the Cornerstone. For our first meeting Andy Anderson told us his life story, from his early years at the schools, now long vanished in Southend (well as schools anyway), and his early years in church life as a Methodist. He went onto tell us about his working life on the railways and of course his memorable trip in the cab for his birthday.

Then we leapt to the other end and Jacqui Wilson gave us an insight into the life at the Pilots group. Peter's Piece

Exile

We are familiar with the condition of exile. Not an experience for most of us who, thanks to God's graciousness, live peacefully in the country of our birth. But the question of immigration and the constant news of hundreds of thousands

of people having, for a variety of reasons, to flee their own country, many at great personal risk, brings the subject constantly to our attention.

Exile does not always have refuge as the cause as it can be because of a way of life, of choice or calling or employment. Whether refuge or choice, exile is living in an alien country that, despite the welcome and acceptance that may well be given by the host country, it is not 'home'. Ask Sohail or Machrina!

This exile theme runs through the Bible, in both old and new testaments, from Genesis to Revelation; exile for the whole human race: for in Genesis 3, after the sin of Adam and Eve we read that - the LORD God banished him from the Garden of Eden to work the ground from which he had been taken¹. The whole human race is living in exile, 'this world is not my home'.² God had originally designed us, 'in his image' to be 'at home', living with him.

Through the Bible history of Israel with her exiles, in Egypt and in Babylon³, her kingdom is still not restored from that exile, God is telling us that it is not just Israel needing to be released from exile, but the whole human race needs release from the exile of the Garden banishment. Graciously God has made provision for that in Jesus the Messiah and his death on the cross for our sin, for by faith in him we can be made heirs together with the faithful of Israel, of God's promises⁴ of a new and better 'home' country.

Hebrews chapters 11 and 12 use the example of the faithful men and women throughout the OT, to encourage us to see that this world is not our home, but trusting in what Jesus has done for us, live out our lives here as exiles, looking forward to the Day of Resurrection when changed, we shall rise to meet the Lord and be with him forever in that new and better country, where *God's dwelling-place* will be *among the people, and he will dwell with them.* They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God⁵. Our exile over! Hallelujah; thanks be to God.

Tricks of the Trade

In past times, when working with marble was less exact, mistakes were frequent. A lesser craftsman could cover up the defect with wax, smoothing it off to a polished finish. In time, with exposure to heat the wax would peel away revealing the underlying flaw. To protect their good name, an artist would often advertise their wares as Sine Cere (without wax), from which we get the word 'sincere'. It's a word we use and like many familiar phrases, we have trivialised 'sincere'. From its use in letters and speeches, 'sincerely' has got a bad press. Sometimes its use can draw more attention to a defect underneath, leading us into its sister 'hypocrisy'.

Jesus had little stomach for hypocrisy. Few of us do. 'Hypocrite', one of the harshest words in our language, is reserved for people we find particularly two-faced. The funny thing about hypocrites; they are usually the last to recognise that they are.

The challenge: To speak and live the truth with integrity, in charity and love. Be real. Be truthful. Be a doer rather than an armchair critic. Avoid getting caught up in other people's trivial foibles when you might have some substantial problems of your own. Try to understand the other person's point of view.

Finally, remember, when you are pointing the finger at anyone - you'll find at least two more on your hand pointing back at you.
