Letter to the fellowship



"It is Written"

We all walk through the various trials that we may face every day. Regardless of our culture or age, we all experience so many forms of tests that come to us during our lifetime. Even Jesus, went through the same

trials and tests in the wilderness. He did not get any special treatment from His Father, in fact it was the Spirit of His Father led him to the place of testing. It was not in a place located beside still waters. It was in the wilderness, a place to see if Jesus would rely on the Word to keep him. His only resource of help was the Holy Spirit that dwelled within him. He was successful in all his trials, and was able to say, *"it is written"*.

The scripture reminds us that the Bible prepares us and sustains us for living and for handling the stress and the wilderness we encounter. It's through reading scripture that we can get a better understanding of who God is and how He wants to work in our lives. When we read the Bible, we have an opportunity to draw close to God and to sense His presence. And it's when we are in God's presence that we can have peace and receive strength that will sustain us through tough times.

The more frequently we read scripture, the more likely we can recall the truth that we read when we need to be reminded of who we are in God and His Son, Jesus. Frequent reading of the Bible will cause the 'chambers in your mind' to more likely be filled with His truths rather than the lies of the enemy. It's what you constantly think about that really impacts on whether you are at peace or whether you are fearful and anxious. And, over the long haul, these two mind-sets will have radically different impacts on your emotional and physical health status.

Jesus, even though he was hungry after 40 days, he did not give in to the temptation the enemy brought to him. He said, *"It is written, that man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word of God.*

Let's not eat the things that will hinder our growth in the things of God. Living in the wilderness will cause us to hear the voice of God. Then as we allow ourselves to be led by the Holy Spirit we will be able to speak in harmony with the Word of God. We will be able to resist the enemy of our soul and the cravings of the fleshly desires that weigh us down and hinder us from doing the will of God. The wilderness will prepare us to stand and say boldly *"it is written"*

Easter's Missing Day

On the day that becomes known as Maundy Thursday the feast of the Jewish Passover was approaching. Jesus sent Peter and John, saying "Go and make preparations for us to eat the Passover". (Luke Chap 22 Vs 7)



At the meal Jesus institutes the celebration of Holy Communion, speaks of a traitor, washes the feet of His disciples and tells them that he will be leaving them "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counsellor to be with you forever" (John Chap 14 Vs 16). Jesus prayed and "When he had finished praying, Jesus left with his disciples and crossed the Kidron Valley. On the other side there was an olive grove, and

he and his disciples went to it". (John Chap 18 Vs 1). It was

here that Jesus was arrested and taken away to be tried. After the trial "Pilate handed him over to be crucified" (John Chap 19 Vs 16).

Thus, on what we now call Good Friday Christ was crucified. "As the Jews did not want the bodies left on the crosses during the Sabbath, they asked Pilate to have the legs broken and



the bodies taken down. But when they came to Jesus and found that he was already dead, they did not break his legs". (John Chap 19 Vs 31 and 33). Joseph of Arimathea asks Pilate for the body and "Because it was the Jewish day of Preparation and since the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there".

(John Chap 19 Vs 42). On the first day of the Jewish week, Sunday, Mary and the disciples discover the tomb is empty and Jesus has been raised from the dead.

So we have Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday. What happened on Holy Saturday, the day in between. The missing day of Easter? Intrigued, Wondering, Fascinated?

Then come along at 11.00 a.m. on 31st March for one hour of quiet contemplation and discussion on this mysterious day. We will close with a light lunch. No booking required. All welcome.

Holy Week

Holy Week and Holy Saturday bring Lent to an end. If, as intended, Lent has been a time of reflection on our Lord and Saviour Jesus the Christ (OT Messiah) encouraging us to a closer relationship with him, it can now be fully focused, as we remember the final

week of Jesus' life, his arrest, travesty of a trial, his torture, his death by crucifixion and burial in a borrowed tomb!

For his disciples, family and friends it was a tragic and cruel end for the one who had done nothing but good, brought life, kindness, comfort and healing. To them all, a hopeless and meaningless end as Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled *He was assigned a grave with the wicked*, crucified as a criminal and with criminals, *and with the rich in his death*, buried in the rich man's, Joseph of Arimathea's, tomb, though he had done no violence, nor was any deceit in his mouth. Isaiah 53:9.

Resurrection is not prominent in the OT and although Jesus had given clues on many occasions that he would rise from the dead, grief and an intense sense of loss in the tragic end to their friendship, blinded their thinking; it was utter despair - *we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel.* Luke 24:21. Back to Isaiah 53 - read the whole passage Isaiah 52:13-53:12 - *'He was led like a sheep to the slaughter, and as a lamb before its shearer is silent, so he did not open his mouth. In his humiliation he was deprived of justice. Who can speak of his descendants? For his life was taken from the earth.' Acts 8:32-33. Yet his death was not in vain for <i>he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was on him, and by his wounds we are healed.* Isaiah 53:5.

To help us draw closer to Jesus through Holy Week there is attached a suggested meditation guide for the last week of Jesus' life. As we move through the rest of Lent, Holy Week and Holy Saturday,¹ may the Holy Spirit prepare us fully to powerfully experience afresh, on Easter Day, the utter joy in the truth of his glorious resurrection, and strengthen within us the hope, which is ours who believe, of our own resurrection on Jesus' triumphant return.
