Letter to the fellowship



REFOCUSING ON GOD

As a minister I know how often work expands to fill up the time available. Always there are sermons to write, calls to make, meetings to attend (locally and countrywide), and deadlines

to meet. If one is not careful one is simply never still. But I have to learn that I cannot be of any help to anyone unless I have moments when I can be quiet. For all of us this can be difficult but sometimes we all need to change the pace and slow down; find renewal and refreshment

I remember visiting Snowdonia with my friends back in 1996. We camped nearby and one day walked to the top of Snowdonia. It was a howling, windy day. But then suddenly, as we reached the top, the wind dropped. There was silence. And everywhere were the mountains and a water reservoir stretched out. It was awesome. For the first time in my life I knew what people meant when they said they believed in God. That definitely helped me to re-connect with God the Creator.

Our lives are defined by our relationships. We see ourselves as husbands and wives, fathers and mothers, sisters and brothers, coworkers, bosses, leaders, neighbours, and friends. We seek out relationships and, when they go right, we feel connected to the people around us.

Shouldn't our relationship with God be the same way?

God promises us a relationship. He promises us His presence. Yet every day millions of Christians go through their life feeling completely disconnected. Their faith feels dead. Their hearts feel cold. Their prayers feel powerless, and they lose battles they can't afford to lose. They don't feel the presence of God.

Maybe you know the feeling. You show up at church, the same as every Sunday, but you're not really there. You're just going through the motions. Acting the same as everyone around you is not the way

to draw closer to God - instead, you'll end up deaf to what He's really trying to say.

If you take a look at your garden ignored for a while, you'll notice a lot of one thing: weeds. Weeds are easy to grow but leave them there and they'll quickly steal the resources your plants need. Distractions are the same way. If you don't tend your relationship with God by removing distractions, you'll live an overcrowded and unproductive life.

We need to take time out of our lives to refuel and refocus on God. Finding a place and time free of distractions gives us the space to recharge our spiritual batteries, renew our love for Christ, and refocus on God's vision for the future.

The variable weather last month has had its toll on the garden, and we have had to do a lot of staking up of tomato plants blown over in the wind and beaten by the rain. The cooler conditions have however prompted the runner beans to start production (they don't like the



heat very much) and I am hoping to get a decent crop before the predicted frosts. I refrained from getting another freezer to store the garden produce (Luke 12: 16-21) so have been giving away what we don't need. My thanks to all who have 'purchased' fruit, veg and preserves - every little helps church funds at a time when our outgoings seem to be exceeding income. Last month, in addition to normal expenditure, we

- had to get a new unit for our heating system to ensure a continuous supply of hot water
- needed the cooker checked as it was going off during cooking
- replaced lightbulbs in the car park
- suffered vandalism to the door push on Bournemouth Park Road.

(and as I prepare these notes the month is not yet over!)

Over the course of September, up to date Personal Information Forms were distributed for the purpose of Church Records and our Directory. If you have not yet returned your form to Mary Goodhew please do so. Then she and I have the task of updating the records and distribution lists in accordance with your expressed wishes, to comply with the General Data Protection Regulations. Compliance also requires that anyone who 'processes data' on behalf of the church also signs another form. This might seem intrusive and unnecessary, but it is what it is and we must do our best to implement the regulations. My thanks to Roger Brett for agreeing to be the Church's Data Protection Officer and making sure everyone understands their obligations.

September saw the resumption of all our activities after the summer break, and everyone is settling back into routine. Messy Church on 3rd September followed the story of Ruth and Naomi and a harvest theme, and Pilots too have been learning harvest stories and making the lovely artwork displayed in the church for Harvest Festival.

Frank and I had a rare weekend away at the beginning of the month and missed John Amos' visit and the evening communion led by our Minister on the first Sunday.

Sohail led the service on 9th September, unusually it was neither church parade nor communion that day.

HOLY HABITS

Acts 2:42-47 The fellowship of the believers

⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer. ⁴³ Everyone was filled with awe at the

many wonders and signs performed by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All the believers were together and had everything in common. ⁴⁵ They sold property and possessions to give to anyone who had need. ⁴⁶ Every day they continued to meet together in the temple courts. They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and enjoying the favour of all the people. And the Lord added to their number daily those who were being saved.

Children and families

What a fantastic privilege to end the summer being part of an event in which over 1000 young people gave their lives to Jesus during the course of 4 weeks at Soul Survivor summer camps. I truly believe that the purpose of youth

ministry is about engaging young people with the living God; encouraging and enabling them to experience different church settings and events, whilst remembering that their journey is personal to them; helping them to live well within a safe family, finding their identity in Jesus and not the world.

Mike Pilavachi and Andy Croft were described by Nicky Gumbel (pioneer of the Alpha course and vicar of Holy Trinity Brompton) as, "Ideal guides for anyone wanting to live daily in the power of the Holy Spirit. They are fun, insightful and have an infectious passion for Jesus." They are both Reverends in the Church of England and part of the leadership teams that head up the charity Soul Survivor.

This was the penultimate party. Mike is now 60 and has been part of this festival for 27 years; he believes many other youth events are going to happen over the next few years - across all Christian denominations.

Each day there are two main services; early morning seminars for youth leaders, afternoon sessions for both the young and old; a

skate park (I was apparently the oldest person they'd taught to skateboard!) free running, cafes, sports, Christian book/clothes stalls, mission and gap year information, late night worship and various other activities all staffed by people with a passion for Jesus and young people.

This year some of the 'children' I have accompanied for the last few years, served on a team (they happened to be in 'Grounds', a café well reputed for delicious cakes that they could take out with them at the end of their shift if not sold, an unexpected bonus!) We had two new young leaders come along to gain experience and build relationships with the new group of younger youth who are moving up from junior church this September.

On the morning of one young man's 12th birthday, we took him to the main service (there are age appropriate workshops for the under twelves) where we experienced a very powerful prayer time and fantastic teaching. He was able to witness his peers freely singing, dancing and praying, all in the name of Jesus. It's wonderful to watch them worshipping and praying together uninhibited because everyone around them is a crazy Christian too!

So often at school these days they can feel isolated in their faith, we encourage them to be filled then to take it home with them; if they aren't confident sharing the Gospel verbally, how to be salt and light in their homes and classrooms; to stand out in their daily lives by living according to God's word. Since going back to school, one young man decided to be generous (one seminar was about how freely and generously God gives to us and how we can emulate his kindness and be like Jesus in our everyday) he took an extra break snack into school. When I enquired how his act of kindness had gone, he told me how he decided to bless the new boy, not use it to show a greedy boy how to share because the 'greedy boy' had been particularly irritating that day!

Another young lady has started to pray for her family and I've had reports back that at least two others have continued to read their Bibles; memories of the dreadful showers; being squashed into the back of a 7 seater for 4 hours; the lack of sleep; the leaking tents; the fussy eaters etc become insignificant as we see the teachings

take root and help to shape these awesome adults of the future. My prayer is that they are part of a huge Revival right here, right now!

Father Heart Conference

On Saturday 15th September The Cornerstone Church kindly hosted this day event, which was organized by Simon Matthews, founder of The Storehouse in Coleman Street. Simon has travelled and studied extensively since leaving this phenomenal outreach in the capable hands of Southend Vineyard a few years ago. Recently, he spent time in New Zealand in a small group learning about the Fatherheart Ministry.

Fatherheart Ministries International was founded in 1997 by James and Denise Jordan after James had a profound encounter with God that changed his life. He learned to walk with his brother Jesus as a cherished son of the living God.

This ministry teaches that true righteousness is the right relationship to God, not about right behaviour in the world (Faith not deeds). It talks of how God is not sin focused, His only interest in sin being to get rid of it! About the law of love, naturally and automatically fulfilling' the law'.

"Love only wants the best and does the best for the ones that it loves", love cannot sin; it teaches that our minds are being transformed as we read His word - changing our thinking so we have the mind of Christ; about God revealing to us only what we are ready and equipped to hear through the Scriptures, about his unconditional, overwhelming love for us. It teaches about the tree of life, tree of knowledge and the law of the spirit, that God truly is Love.

We had a great day; I got to catch up with a few dear friends, some of whom I haven't seen for years, including the tutor who ran the first Bible Ministry course I attended!

We had several comments from participants admiring our fabulous venue, each expressing what a wonderfully welcoming atmosphere there is. My favourite book from Fatherheart ministries is 'The Ancient Road Rediscovered' (What the Early Church Knew) by M.James Jordan. It really helped me to understand why as Christians we often carry guilt and how amazing it is learning to walk as a daughter of the King.

We have welcomed more newcomers and will continue with the 15+ lounge, even though it's not widely used. It's good for the older ones to have a space of their own if they want to escape the sometimes boisterous crowd - I've banned dodgeball until I remember to buy some ice packs!

A Sacrament!

Holy Communion is known as a Sacrament – An outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace. Grace, coming from the Greek word *charis* means 'gift' so, through the act of Communion – the outward and

visible sign, with an inward and spiritual gift or blessing, from God as we obey our Lord as we remember him.

Of the seven sacraments acknowledged in other parts of the Christian church, we in the URC only recognise two of them, Communion and Baptism. Look at the others and see why they might also be considered sacraments; – they are confirmation (the publicly professing a personal faith as a person formally becomes a member of a local church), ordination, marriage, (confession &) absolution and healing. (the laying on of hands.)

In Communion the broken bread and the shared cup are the visible signs, a reminder of Jesus and what he did for us. As we eat and drink; in the quietness of our hearts communing with Him, we prayerfully remember afresh Jesus as 'My Lord and my God!', giving thanks for his death



and victorious resurrection on my behalf, we receive a renewing and strengthening of our faith, the inward and spiritual grace.

The bread remains bread and the wine remains wine, both after the Communion Prayer and after our eating and drinking, the physical substance of neither changes. But we have been obedient to Our Lord's command 'This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me.' --- In the same way, after supper he took the cup, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this, whenever you drink it, in remembrance of me.' 1 Corinthians 11:24-25.

In a Communion Prayer we sometimes hear the instructive bidding, 'and feed on Him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.' This is based on our Lords words in John 6 *I am the bread of life*. v.48 --- the one who feeds on me will live because of me. v.57. [Read the whole chapter for context.] We need to feed on Jesus daily not just at Communion.

Each time we come to Communion do I experience and enjoy it as a sacrament? Each time we break the bread and drink from the cup, do I feel God has imparted something to me, as the simple meal becomes a spiritual Feast?
