Manger and the Cross

The story of Jesus' birth has an immense progeny. Our planet fairly teems with stories and songs, paintings and drama that got their start from this story. The reproductive energies

show no sign of tapering off. Writers and singers and artists, to say nothing of countless children and parents and grandparents all over the world, continue to find fresh and novel ways of keeping this story going.

But even more impressive are the lives that continue to get a fresh start; a new birth; in the story of this birth. Day after day, men and women who feel more dead than alive, in the hearing of singing or seeing this story, rediscover the utter and unspeakable and beautiful preciousness of life. The story of Jesus's birth gets reproduced in these human lives still, over and over and over again.

The key to Christmas is to remember what it is supposed to celebrate: the birth of Jesus Christ. If it weren't for Christ, there would be no Christmas.

And the key to keeping Christ at the centre of our Christmas is to keep our eyes on Him, and not let ourselves be distracted by everything else that is going on. I know that's easier said than done; Christmas has grown increasingly busy (and secular), and Christ easily gets crowded out by all the activities and the stress on material things.

We need to stop and reflect on why Jesus' birth is so important. Is it simply because He was a great man – or was He more than that? The Bible says He was God in human flesh. Think of it: Just over two thousand years ago, God came down from heaven and became a little baby! "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). But He didn't stay an infant; He went to the cross, so we could become part of His family forever. Have you put your faith in Him?

The true message of Christmas is that Eternal God came to earth in the form of man in order to save His own creation. It was necessary because fallen man is mired in sin, and there is no remission of sin without the shedding of blood.

The One we see in the manger is fully God who came to earth to die so that you and I could have forgiveness of our sins, so that we would receive the greatest gift of all.

As your family celebrates Christmas this year, take time to turn your attention to Christ. Because our best Christmas comes not from the gaily-wrapped presents under the Christmas tree, but from the One wrapped in swaddling clothes lying in a wooden manger in the town of Bethlehem, the One who's birthday we celebrate.

Wishing you all a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous, wonderful and blessed New Year.

Jesus is the light

This was the focus for Pilots on 31st October. However, the majority of our Deck Hands and Voyagers were drawn into the world of trick or treat and scary costumes; we even had one passing parent pop in to use the toilet - she explained her son was a bit

scared, that she belonged to the Salvation Army and didn't really like the celebrations but what could she do when all his friends were dressing up and going out? (One house two blocks along from us transforms into a real house of horror and displays moving skeletons, witches and light up skulls from early October, which I find disturbing in the daylight and I'm a brave grown up). I told her what we were celebrating and refrained from telling her to explain to her 6 year old that Halloween has its roots in the occult and that as a Christian mother she has a duty not to participate in anything not of the Lord! But I do feel I should have explained why it's not ok to endorse such celebrations and felt guite sad that the lure of candy kept the majority of our attendees away. However, it made our time with the few children we had very special. Derek had organized some wonderful team games using torches and our Minister and his family thoroughly enjoyed making up the numbers joining in the games enthusiastically. The craft and story focused on Jesus lighting up the darkness and we were able to fully engage with each child with time to listen and answer their questions. Zoy and Joan prepared a party tea for us all to eat as a family and we shared the cakes the children had decorated for dessert. The few children that attended are regulars. One little girl in particular often voices misconceptions (one week it took me over 10 minutes to convince her that Jesus and Boaz were not the same man!) and we had a delightful time hearing her peers' opinions about her views on God, interjecting with truth if necessary.

It's a rare joy in our busy lives to be able to sit and observe the fruits of our labour; I'm often surprised at the depth of their understanding and recall of the Bible stories. I believe these children will grow up knowing that they are loved by our heavenly Father, who created the heavens and the earth. I pray that we can teach them to accept and

follow Jesus, to be thankful for all they have and to love God wholeheartedly. Watch out for news of Pilots/Junior church's Nativity celebrations in the notices.

Whisper

We still haven't had a response to our request for funding from 20/20 vision so I'm presuming no news is good news and would like to thank those who support this project financially in the meantime.

Two of our ladies have seen a significant improvement in their flexibility and balance and all are enjoying the positive atmosphere the prayer and music creates. The movements can be adapted to suit individual needs so the class is open to all ages and abilities. There are a couple of day and time changes during November and



December which will given out with the notices on Sundays and listed on the notice board. There will also be a short demonstration from the group at the Christmas Fayre.

Russian Speakers' Group

Olena is a delightful lady from a country in the former Soviet Union (that I can't spell or pronounce) who I met in a Kids Matter parenting group in September, she told me how she felt very isolated when she first came to England and how a pastor from a local church befriended and encouraged her.

Olena started to volunteer with a homeless project where she made friends and recognised a real need for community, so set up a facebook group for foreign speakers living in Southend; around 80 people joined and over 40 turned up for their first meeting. For several weeks the group were nomadic, having to meet at different times on odd days until they started meeting here at The Cornerstone 1-3pm every Sunday.

Numbers have begun to increase again now and Olena has asked me to explain that this social gathering is for everyone - all are welcome. If you do come along you could learn some Russian; learn to dance; learn about English grammar, play games, drink tea, chat, immerse yourself with their resident artist's weekly masterpiece or simply watch the children play. They are a diverse, friendly bunch, who Olena is hoping will join her for several wonderful Christmas activities and crafts, including a pantomime during the next few weeks.

Youth Club

Our young people are going to run the Christmas Fayre this year (obviously we'll help a bit!) on Saturday 15th December, 1.00 p.m. - 4.00 p.m.

So far they've designed the flyer and program; planned a show; persuaded mums to come to run stalls, make cakes and find raffle prizes - a great start. We need some more books, puzzles and games (in good condition) if you are able to source them. No soft toys please. It has been a privilege to watch them work together and lots of fun planning the stalls.

The girls from Friday nights have choreographed all the dances in the performance themselves using Christian songs in keeping with our Friday gatherings. We hope the singing group will be able join our other vocalists to extend the range of entertainment. Tickets for the show will be on sale for 50p each the Sunday before the event and on the day.

We had a representative from Usborne Books at Toddler group in October and they are happy to come back for the afternoon; all the books are reasonably priced and she has several lovely Christmas packs to offer. There will be the usual Tombola, guess the name of the elf, a raffle, guess how many sweets in a jar, Bric-a-Brac etc. In addition there will 3 or 4 stalls supporting local ladies who run their own small businesses making brooches, vegan sweets, lamps, bunting and a Body Shop party host. Our own crafters have made some delightful knitted characters and tree decorations, which make perfect original gifts and I believe one of their beautiful blankets has been offered as a raffle prize; if anyone would like to bake us some pies or cakes to add to our refreshments list please let Mary or Lisa know.



This is the perfect time of year to reach out to those who don't yet know the joy that comes from walking with Jesus. I still believe that we can make our local churches the centre of every community across Southend. I believe we can help raise Godly children who will lead their parents back to the Lord. In the early Church so

many influential leaders were of a tender age and they didn't always have it easy but they persevered and the churches grew.

There is a huge revival happening in Colombia at present; thousands of people giving their lives in an instant, having felt the touch of The Holy Spirit; it may not be like that across Europe but one at a time in Southend will signal rejoicing in Heaven. I pray we can reflect His nature in our own characters and that we share the Good News in our words and actions in our everyday because the world so needs to know!

News from the Forum

At our first meeting in November we had a very interesting and informative talk from Shawn Clarke as he took us through the topic of Advent Now and Then.

Shawn explained how the name we use now for the season of preparation for Christmas came into our language from the Latin word Adventus which means Arrival, and how the past Popes had such an influence on our traditions today.

The date we use now of December 25th is, relatively speaking, modern in that in the early life of the church Christmas has been celebrated in every month of the year! Once it was established on the December date, the date of the Feast of the Annunciation, celebrating the visit of the Angel to Mary announcing the coming of the Christ as a baby, was set as 25th March. This fixed Christmas as nine months later on 25th December!

We sing carols each year with words that have come down through the centuries, a few of which have come from the writings of Popes.

We no longer have a tradition of fasting in our church but it is still adhered to in the more catholic traditions and Shawn expressed his relief that it is now only expected on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Whereas, many centuries ago, it used to be required for Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays during Advent and on Christmas Evel

We ended with some explanations and pictures of the Advent Wreath which we have each year. By the way, the dripping of wax on the floor will be a thing of the past here now as technology has come to our aid and we will be having LED lights this year.



From fasting to feasting - our last meeting of the month was when 25 of us, with some of the partners, sat down to a meal in the foyer. It was a very happy occasion and our thanks go to Zoy who volunteered to cook it for us, it was lovely Zoy, Thank you very much, also to Rob and Sharon for helping lay-up and Joan and

Brenda for the help with serving.

The Amaryllis you gave me was very unexpected and I look forward to the green shoots appearing soon.

And so to our last meeting of 2018 when on December 11th we will be having an afternoon of Christmas music and singing with John and his friends with Ukulele and Guitars.

After my talk to the Forum, I read two very ancient prayers associated with the latter days of Advent. We think they originated in 5th Century France. We know they have been said by the Priests/Ministers of different Christian traditions for many centuries.

They are called the "O" Antiphons. Antiphons are verses of psalms or prayers used during the Divine Office (the daily prayers of Priests and Religious), these prayers are still used today in the Presbyterian (USA), Lutheran and Catholic traditions. There are seven of these prayers and they are said over the last seven days of Advent. Alison asked that I include one for the readers of this magazine.

O Emmanuel: O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Saviour of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God, Isaiah had prophesied, The Lord himself will give you this sign: the Virgin shall be with child, and bear a son, and shall name him Emmanuel.

(Isaiah 7:14). Remember Emmanuel means God is with us.

Christ in ALL the Scriptures

We tend to think that if we want to learn more of Jesus, who he is, why he was born, lived, died, resurrected and Ascended into heaven then we need to read the NT. This is only partially true. It is true that the

historical account of his earthly life and indeed his teaching, including that through the Apostles, is recorded in the NT, but who he is and the promise and purpose of his coming is more fully revealed in the OT. These are the very Scriptures that testify about me, Jesus said, John 5:39.

The wonderful and glorious truth is that Jesus '--- the Messiah, the Son of the living God', (Matthew 16:16) is the fulfilment of the promises of God, which were foretold in the OT. There are, not only references telling us directly of the Messiah¹, but there are, as I said last month, numerous prophecies as well, that speak of the Deity, person, status, nature, character, work, family line, place of birth, even the nature of his conception, his life, his death by crucifixion, his burial, his resurrection, his redemptive work but also of the ultimate victory, glory and the eternal sovereign reign, of the Messiah, which we are in grave danger of missing if we are not aware that Christ means Messiah and all that that title signifies in the OT as well as in the NT. We only get a part of the great truth and wonder of who Jesus fully is, if we view the OT as of lesser importance than the NT in speaking to us about Jesus.

From the first verse of the NT², Matthew himself refers his readers back to the OT 12 times confirming that the Messiah is revealed and promised there. Further, in chapter 1 vv. 22-23; quoting from Isaiah 7:14, we learn that his very name Immanuel - 'God with us' - declares his Deity.

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¹ Psalm 2:2 & 7; Daniel 9:25-26. Psalm 22 particularly vv.14-15 describes crucifixion some centuries before it had been in use by the Romans!

² Matthew 1:1 see Genesis 12:7

To be topical, Christmas is coming, Matthew then refers to the prophecies of the Messiah's conception³ and the place of his birth, Bethlehem⁴. Matthew recounts the details of the miraculous conception⁵ while Luke gives the historical background events⁶ telling how God's plans worked out when a virgin from the Galilean town of Nazareth came to be in Bethlehem, some 90 miles south of her home, for the birth of her first born, Jesus the Messiah.

So, let's go on, reading the OT side by side with the NT discovering Jesus there and see the faithfulness of God in fulfilling his promises of redemption for us humans in the coming and work of his Messiah, Jesus.
