SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

I made two very contrasting visits to High Leigh Christian Conference Centre this month. The first was for the Messy Church International Conference (MCIC19), the second the URC Mission Council.

MCIC19 was truly multi-national with delegates from as far as Canada and the US, Australia and New Zealand, and South Africa; and closer to home from many European countries. It was fabulous to exchange news and ideas with everyone and I hope you took the opportunity to look at some of the updates on The Cornerstone's Facebook page. I have prepared a full report that can be found in the foyer, but if you would like to read it at your leisure I can email a copy. The weekend was fun and inspiring, and I am sure we will be implementing some new things soon, particularly songs from the wonderful Fischy Music.

The URC MC was also inspiring in a different way, restrained as it is by rituals, rules and standing orders. I always enjoy the daily worship as there are some great hymns out there that you don't see in R&S or CMP, new ones entirely and new words to familiar tunes. Daily Bible study was led by Rev Neil Pickering, principal of Westminster College, accompanied by artwork to focus our thoughts. We grappled out way through progress reports from the various departments, made plans to recruit a new General Secretary and Deputy when the present incumbents retire next year, laid the foundations for Safeguarding in the years ahead, and considered how best to share the total URC resources over the three nations. But perhaps the most far-reaching decision was the one, prompted by the Synod of Scotland, to divest our investments from fossil fuels and to encourage synods and local churches to do the same.

On Monday 20th several of us attended the Elders' Roadshow at Wickford, a time to refresh our knowledge of the various responsibilities, and learn of the resources available from Synod to help; the emphasis was very much on the why we do what we do, rather than the what and fitted in well with the Holy Habit theme of Service which our own Elders looked at earlier in the month.

Frank and I enjoyed a day out to the Chelsea Flower Show for my birthday on 22nd May, very crowded but as ever full of wonderful scents and ideas. The following morning I was up and out very early (for me) for a meeting at Synod office, then our own church meeting in the evening. Yay, two lots of minutes for Friday!! It has been a very busy month.

At worship, our service on the first Sunday was led by Robert Wiseman with Sohail taking the evening Communion service. Messy Church on 7th May was on the Holy Habit of Prayer, in particular the need to be persistent on occasion, as with the parable of the Unjust Judge. The Parade Service was led by our friend Rev. Trevor Williams, in his own unique style, talking about the only way to get to heaven by loving and following Jesus; all the certificates we gain throughout life count for nothing. Roger Brett led the service on 19th and his children's address focussed on the Greek alphabet and how much of it has become part of our culture and language. At the time of writing these notes, it is expected that our Minister, Sohail, will lead worship on the final Sunday of the month.

A reminder about the premises and furnishings. It is to be expected with the amount of usage we have that from time to time things break, become loose or otherwise damaged. If you spot something

that needs attention do please fill in a report form (hanging next to reception desk) and leave it by the computer. That way I can see what needs to be done, and where necessary call Frank from home with the required equipment. Outside, there has been a lot of damage recently to the garden fence, some at least by cars reversing too far as well as over-



exuberant play. The garden is a vital part of our pre-school provision and we do have to ensure it is a safe area, so I am asking everyone to be careful as we do not want to be replacing the fence just yet! Thank You.

As I mentioned earlier, this month our Elders considered the Holy Habit of Service particularly to the local community, and the distinction between neighbourhood (where few of us now live) and community which in our context is intentional and can come about from the events and activities we host. One example was the recent Kids Matter course that was arranged by Lisa in conjunction with the Vineyard, from which it became apparent that some families needed a safe space to "hang out", this gave rise to the Friday morning Coffee and Cake. Do pop in sometimes and have a chat.

It was also suggested at Elders' Meeting that everyone can play their part in supporting the various activities with prayer; so our regular meetings are now included in the monthly prayer diary. If you have any suggestions as to how the church can further support the community please do let me, or any Elder, know. Meanwhile I leave you with this item prepared for the Holy Habits programme by Rev. Melanie Smith:

'Serving' is a Holy Habit that is already a large part of our own and church lives. But are there any additional clues we can pick up from a look at the Bible?

Take a look at any or all of the following passages:

Matthew 8: 14-16, Mark 14: 3-9, Luke 10: 38-42, John 13: 3-10a and consider:

Who is being served?
What emotions are on display?
How are people changed by this encounter?
When could we offer this kind of service?
Which other Holy Habits are happening here (if any)?
Not all questions will apply to all passages.

It is strange that in most cases, serving and receiving are almost interchangeable, that service is often accompanied by a certain resistance by others, that people seem to be changed by these encounters, and several of the Holy Habits are on display - including Jesus using most opportunities to teach those around him.

Peter's Piece

The Lord's Prayer 2 (continued)

We use the traditional, best-known, well-loved and most used wording, which comes from the 1611 KJV of the Bible. It is printed on the inside back cover of our Hymn Books - Rejoice and Sing - and is as we pray the

prayer together most Sundays. Some people like to change the 'thy' to 'your' and 'thine' to 'yours' to lose the words which are not in our everyday vocabulary. Others prefer to stick with the traditional English wording, feeling that this lifts our approach above the mundane and ordinary: but it is of small consequence which words we use providing, we mean from the heart what we are saying, not rushing it but thoughtfully and prayerfully.

You will observe that there are some minor differences between Matthew's and Luke's Gospel records; while the doxology, with which our version of the prayer ends, is not given in either Gospel in the NIV [but see the NIV footnote at Matthew 6:13b] although it is included and used in many very early MSS.

The prayer consists of both praise and petition, opening with the first three lines in adoration and praise and concludes with a doxology [lit. glory (doxa) - word (logos)] a liturgical statement of praise: it is good to follow our Lord's teaching and surround our petitions with praise and thanksgiving. Paul - *Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God.* Philippians 4:6. 1 Timothy 2:1.

The prayer is addressed to God as Father and generally speaking our prayers should be addressed to our God as Father; we come through Jesus Christ His Son, John 14:6 Jesus answered, 'I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me, (c.f. John 14:13 et al.) resting in his completed work of redemption, his shed blood paying the price: we pray in the Spirit, John 4:24 God is spirit, and his worshippers must worship in the Spirit and in truth.' Thus, all Three Persons of the Trinity are involved in our prayer life.

With the whole prayer, we need to be aware of at least something of what this means as we say it, otherwise it becomes vain repetition. Perhaps we should use and meditate on it between Sundays so that we have in our hearts a meaningful understanding of exactly what we are saying and asking and not merely reciting words. Of course, the same goes for the Holy Communion; as time is brief when participating together in both, we need to fill our hearts and minds with the meaningful significance before and after sharing in them.

On the two months before our break for August, we will, on Tuesday 18 June, be taking an overall look at the General Epistles, then on Tuesday 16 July an overall look at the Pauline Epistles.

After the summer break we will begin a closer look at this large part of the NT, written to the early churches, with the possible exception of John's writings, within 50 years of Jesus' lifetime, as we consider each of the letters.

All are very welcome to Digging Deeper as together, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we discover more of the great and exciting truths God has for us, in his Word. *Do your best,* [study KJV] to present yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. 2 Timothy 2:15,
