
The following Sunday Roger Brett led the service and, it being Fathers' Day, the gentlemen of the church were presented with a gift

During the month most of our organisations will wind up the summer session and take a break until September. There are no pressing items of business to be decided, and due to both our meeting Chairman and his usual deputy being away on 25th July, there will be no Church meeting.

In August once again we welcome the Boys' and Girls' Brigades from Belfast City Mission to stay on our premises for the week. Please do remember that, with established exceptions, they have exclusive use of the buildings. One of these exceptions is of course the Sunday service on 4th August, which will be an all-age service and the boys, girls and officers will take part. I look forward to counting over 100 heads raised in worship that morning!

Sadly the holiday club arranged for August has had to be cancelled, due to Lisa's continued illness; please remember her in your prayers too. Weather permitting, we will have a youth children and family afternoon in Southchurch Park on 14th August 2.30 - 5 p.m. A Teddy Bears Picnic, games for little ones and a range of games and activities for older children and youth. Those under 18 must be accompanied by a parent or carer who will remain responsible for them; and bring your own picnic.

You may recall that last autumn we undertook a paper exercise to obtain Personal Information consents from all members and worshippers, as required by GDPR. This was a learning curve for those managing the scheme and not everyone returned their forms, hence we have not yet been able to produce a meaningful Church Directory. In addition, regulations require that your information is verified annually and elders have approved the following procedure:

- 1. On Sundays 22nd and 29th September new forms will be issued to all members and regular worshippers. Those present will be invited to complete the forms there and then.
- 2. All forms should be returned to Mary by 17th October.
- 3. In succeeding years, a new form will only be required if your personal information has changed, or you wish to add or remove any of the permissions given.
- 4. If there is no change, you will be invited to verify by signing a dated label to be attached to your existing form.

If you have any questions please speak to Roger Brett, the church's Data Protection Officer, or Mary Goodhew who is Data Processor for this particular piece of work.

Weekend children's parties generate a significant part of the church's income but it does mean at least one of our keyholders has to be present at the beginning and end of each booking. Thus far we have managed with a few willing volunteers, some of whom forego family stuff to serve the church in this way. There is always room for more people to share this responsibility so please do consider if

you can help. If you are not an existing keyholder, keys can be provided!

Peter's Piece

Our 'Father'.

Jesus gave this as pattern of prayer for all who know God as Father. It opens with praise and adoration, acknowledging God as Father, where he is, and that his very Name is to be honoured as Holy, seeking

the coming of his Kingdom and the fulfilment of his will.

There is a sense in which God is the father of all human beings, in that he is the Creator God: The One God who made and sustains not only us human beings and this world, but the whole universe.

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Genesis 1:1 Paul Ephesians 4:6 There is --- One God and Father of all, but John in the introduction to his Gospel introduces a deeper sense of the Fatherhood of God in John 1:9-13 The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognise him. He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God -children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God.

When Jesus, God's Son, the true light, came into this world, in human form, people rejected, disowned and killed him and a great many still do so today. They have therefore ceded the right to call on God as Father. But the good news is that those who have accepted Jesus, who he is, what he has done, by new birth, Jesus has given them the right to be children of God and can therefore truly know and address God as Father; because those believing, trusting in Jesus and his saving work, have been born anew of God into the family of God.

In John 3:1-21, Jesus' chat with Nicodemas, he spells this out clearly, including the well-known verse 16. For God so loved the

world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.

'Our' Father - by these words Jesus indicates a new relationship between those who belong to him, we are together in one family and so there is a special affinity between one another. Paul - as we have opportunity, let us do good to all people, especially to those who belong to the family of believers. Galatians 6:10. With this in mind some Christians address fellow believers as brother or sister, openly acknowledging our true relationship with each other in Christ Jesus.

Even if we use this prayer on our own, we are reminded that we are not alone, we are part of a family, the family of God and have family ties with other members and they with us.
