Following the removal of legal COVID restrictions, there is no longer a limit on the number of people we can accommodate for worship including singing, and we look forward to welcoming everyone back, including children. However, recognising that some people may still be very cautious about the possibility of contracting Covid-19, there are some measures we can all take in the interests of the most vulnerable:

- Hand sanitiser remains available at both entrances, and the worship space will continue to be well ventilated
- You are no longer required to book or sign in, although the QR code remains available if you wish to use it
- You may wish to take a regular Lateral Flow Test to determine whether or not you are likely to be carrying infection. These are available free from pharmacies or by post from Order coronavirus (COVID-19) rapid lateral flow tests GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)
- There are re-usable stickers available for you to indicate how you would prefer to be greeted by fellow worshippers
- Face coverings are no longer mandatory; however you may prefer to use one to minimise your risk to others particularly when moving around, singing aloud or in close proximity (eg queuing for coffee)
- If you prefer not to sit close to people outside your household please continue to deploy the "Do not use this seat" markers. Additionally there are under-used areas of the worship space and/or foyer.
- For the time being we will refrain from passing an offertory bag from person to person; a collection plate is available at the rear of the worship space. Please make your offering by the close of the service to assist the Treasurer in timely counting
- Likewise, Communion this month will be laid out for you to come forward and collect; Elders will keep this under review.

PILOTS, MESSY CHURCH, TODDLERS AND YOUTH CLUB

During the lockdown we have been keeping in touch with our children, teens and families by sending out a Messy Church in a bag once a month and forwarding the weekly Families on Faith Adventures at Home online material produced by the Children and Youth team at Church House. We've also had a Holiday Club, Advent and Lent packs to send out.



This has all been great but no substitute for meeting regularly with all our families, which we have really missed.

I am delighted then to announce that we are able to restart our faceto-face activities. Toddlers has already resumed and Pilots. Messy Church and Youth Club will begin from **Friday**, **10th September**. This is a change of day for Pilots and Messy Church.

Messy Church will be on the 1st Friday of each month from 5.00 to 6.30 pm and Pilots every other Friday, also from 5.00 to 6.30 pm.

Youth Club will continue to run from 7.00 to 9.00 pm.

It has been decided to change the day for a number of reasons. With Messy Church on the 1st Tuesday, and both Toddlers and Pilots on a Wednesday, Youth Club on a Friday and Elders also on the 1st Thursday of the month, it was becoming increasingly difficult for our volunteers (several of whom are involved in all these things).

Moving Pilots and Messy Church to a Friday will hopefully make it a lot easier for us. We also want to make the change from Pilots to Youth Club when our youngsters reach 11 easier by being on the

same night. It will also give us the opportunity to occasionally extend the meeting time of Pilots to later in the evening if we want to go out somewhere or hold a film night as the children do not have to get up for school the following morning.

We have not seen our youngsters since March 2020 so are uncertain how many will return to our activities. Many may feel anxious about coming back and we are also uncertain about how things will go, so please pray for our youngsters, families and staff as we resume.

FAITH-FILLED LIFE - AN INTRODUCTION

Earlier this year, a few of the Cornerstone Elders took part in a URC course called 'Faith-filled Life'.

Faith-filled Life is the first part of *Stepwise*, the discipleship development programme run by the United Reformed Church. It sets out to answer 2 big questions: 'What am I on the planet for?' And 'Where do I belong?'

That might sound daunting, but Stepwise is really for everyone: all ages, shapes and sizes - including you! It allows you to reflect on, and develop, your Christian faith, and to be stimulated and challenged in the context of your own community and church.

It emphasises the importance of learning from your daily life, wherever you are and whoever God might be calling you to be, and helps you to see how you can make a positive and transformative difference in your own life and the lives of others.

We found Faith-filled Life very enriching. The discussions and activities we worked on really helped us to think about our role in the Church, and also the wider role of the Cornerstone in our local area.

In this series for New Horizons, each month I'll be sharing a reflection on one of the sessions that makes up the 'Faith-filled Life course'. We'll cover the following topics as we go along:

1. The Bible and Mission

What is the Bible? How do we read and understand it.
We'll also begin to think about 'Mission' and what it means for us.

2. Who am I?

 'Who am I?' in relation to God. We will consider this question from a theological point of view (nothing too complex!)

3. Where do I fit?

 We'll discuss where we might fit in God's plan, and how we can identify what God is doing in our community.

4. What Journey am I on?

• We'll consider our own 'walk with God', and when God has influenced our decision-making.

5. How do I deal with Challenges?

• What resources does our faith give us to help us with the challenges of everyday life?

6. Which way now?

 We'll bring together and reflect on the different aspects of Faith-filled Life, and what our next steps might be in our lives as followers of Christ.

Throughout the whole series, one of the big questions we'll keep coming back to is 'Where have I seen God recently?'

You can try to practice this by thinking about this question at least once a week.

Where have you seen him? Perhaps in a beautiful sunset, perhaps in the kindness of a stranger, perhaps in a prayer being answered or old friend getting in touch again. Take a moment to look back at your experiences and look for 'God moments' within them. We can then start to think about how God can use you in other people's lives.

I hope you'll enjoy the series!

Soli Deo gloria ("glory to God alone")

This month we come to the fifth and final 'Latin Slogan' which defines the Reformation and the Salvation we preach, "Glory be to God alone."

We the sons of Adam, humans, born under condemnation, as Jesus tells Nicodemus *whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.*

Till that moment of belief, we stand marred by inherited sin, following after our ancestor Adam, and are therefore under the condemnation of God, *for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God*,

But glory to God for he has provided a way for us to be set free from that inherited condemnation, by faith in his Son Jesus the Christ who died on the cross bearing for us, each one individually, the condemnation. As we place our faith and trust in Jesus we are born again, freed from condemnation, born not from Adam but born anew in Jesus.
