Letter to the Fellowship

God's Gift for Us all

Have you ever attended a party or programme where you felt you didn't really want to come but for others you had to come?

Around Christmas time, we frequently see the sign that says, "Jesus Is **The** Reason For The Season." When we look at our frenzied, commercialized world around Christmas, it is sometimes difficult to focus on the real reason for the season. However, when we focus on Jesus at Christmas – or any other time – our lives become so much more meaningful and abundant.

Jesus came into a world over 2000 years ago full of confusion, death, loneliness, fear, addictions, hatred, alienation, strife and greed. This world has not changed much in 2000 years. The gospel of Jesus Christ still comes as a light in the darkness. The darkness of the world cannot overcome the light of Jesus Christ.

Jesus came as a weak, tiny baby. He did not come as a powerful worldly king. God's only son entered life in the most humble of circumstances. For Mary and Joseph, there was no hospitality. They were homeless. They were not welcomed. They were rejected. The Messiah of Israel was born in poverty. Jesus was laid in a manger, a feeding trough. Ironically, this beloved child became the food for the whole world. He became the most hospitable, the most welcoming and the most accepting being who ever lived.

One thing is certain, the baby Jesus was loved. As he was laid in the manger, he was wrapped in swaddling clothes. What a wonderful image of love that is. His parents were not about to neglect him in any way.

The baby Jesus came as a gift from God the Father. He came to share our human nature. He came to live and die as one of us. Jesus became like us, so that we might become more like God. Man will live forever more because of Christmas day.

The Lord knows that we are all alone and isolated at many points in our lives. Jesus came because he desires a loving, merciful relationship with each one of us. He wants us to be in fellowship with one another. At some point in the future, God has a great and wonderful party planned for us in heaven.

The baby Jesus came that all people might be drawn from the world into the goodness and mercy of God. We have a God who humbled himself so that we can learn the true nature of love. We have a God that offers each of us hospitality and a welcoming heart. We have a God who especially loves the lowest and the weakest. We have a God who is so courageous that he sacrificed his own son for you and me. Jesus showed throughout his life that we matter greatly to God.

God still comes to us much like the baby Jesus. He tells us we are his beloved children. God's voice resounds from all directions. God says to us, "You are my beloved." When God speaks and acts, it is accomplished.

As Christmas approaches, we will all find ourselves cleaning, decorating, and preparing our homes, and of course, we should be doing that. It seems incredible to be saying 2021 is drawing to a close but here we are! Plans for our Advent and Christmas services are well under way and we hope we will be able to proceed uninterrupted by lockdowns or other restrictions



Faith-Filled Life Part 4: Where do I fit?

So far in this series we have looked at why we are here, what the Bible offers us and began thinking about what mission is and how we are involved in it. Last month we also considered who we are in relation to God.

The aim of this article, **Where do I fit?**, is to consider what living a Godly life involves, think a bit about discipleship, and look further at mission and how these ideas relate to our local community.

How we live matters. Our relationship with Jesus should make Christians stand out as 'different' within our communities.

Would you know a Christian if you met them in the street? Do you think of certain qualities and the way a person might live when you think about being a Christian?

Do you think people can identify you as Christian by the way you act?

As well as considering how we live our lives, it's also worthwhile to think about *why* we are living them the way we do.

If you have a moment, read John 21 v 15-19 in your Bible. We see a conversation Jesus has with Peter, when the latter receives instructions from Jesus to 'Feed my lambs', 'Tend my sheep' and to 'Feed my sheep'.

Peter was given a mission - a purpose. He was instructed to go forth and nurture the early church, the 'flock' who needed tending after Jesus had ascended and left them.

It has become common for churches, to use the term 'mission statement' when referring to their core purpose or values. The word 'mission' comes from a Latin word meaning 'sent'. Missionaries therefore are people sent by the church to spread the good news of God revealed in Jesus to those who have not yet heard it.

But this is only part of the story. In recent decades Christian Leaders have begun to emphasise that mission is an activity that God does,

as well as Christians. It is much more that God is always acting in the world, and for the world, and that we should seek to join in more actively with what God is doing.

Throughout the Bible, and throughout history, God sends what is needed in order to catch people's attention. The Anglican Church has developed five 'marks of mission' which have been widely adopted as an understanding of what contemporary mission is about.

Some churches abbreviate the five marks to five words:

TELL - TEACH - TEND - TRANSFORM - TREASURE.

The five marks of mission are as follows:

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service
- To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and to pursue peace and reconciliation
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Mission is God's work in the world, and for the world. We can understand a missional church is one that sends its members out into their community trusting that God will use them as needed. A missional disciple is a follower of Jesus who consciously makes friends and connections beyond their church so that God can use them however God wishes.

Let's pray that God can raise up both the Cornerstone, and ourselves as individuals, for his Mission.

Lastly, as always I invite you to think about where you have seen God in the past month. Were there any opportunities he gave you to tell, teach, tend transform or treasure?

Keep an eye out in the month ahead for His influence. We may not know His plan, but there will definitely be a place where you fit into it!

Ending and Beginning

Another year ends, a new one begins. A good number of us have been here many times before! To some extent this is the season of resolutions that this annual event brings. It certainly is, if nothing else, a call to reflect as we are reminded, as if we needed to be, of our mortality, the

passing of time, and our aging.

King David in one of his reflections, Psalm 144:3 says of humans - *They are like a breath; their days are like a fleeting shadow.* Job (the oldest book in the Bible, possibly 1,000 years before David!) 7:7. says - *Remember, O God, that my life is but a breath;* If we consider the millions of years time span that the age of our planet is, then truly our lives are very brief!

I know when I married, old age seemed an impossible time away, it stretched into the distant future and would take for ever to reach. As I have gone, day by day, through my life, although many important events occurred, marriage, children, moving home, changing jobs, deaths in the family of members ahead of me, the end still seemed no nearer! Even early retirement did not seem to register just how quickly life was slipping by. What is your life? You are a mist that appears for a little while and then vanishes. James 4:14. James letter is practical Christianity, not, as suggested by Martin Luther, an epistle of straw, but that our faith in Jesus should indeed control all that we say, do and think.

Job through his trials and in his converse with his 'friends' over the suffering of the innocent is led to see that length of his days, and ours, are in God's hands - as long as I have life within me, the breath of God in my nostrils, Job 27:3. It's God himself who determines the length of our life.

As with Job, none of us know exactly how long we shall live; each day is a gift from God, and should be lived as such acknowledging and lived *doing all to the glory of God.* 1 Corinthians 10:31.

So, as we stand on the threshold of another new year let us thank God for the life he has graciously given us, not just our physical existence but for eternal life that we can also enjoy by faith in Jesus his Son and the work he accomplished by his death on the cross that we may have life and have it to the full. John 10:10 - I give them eternal life and they shall never perish. v.28

Yes, as the marker of the passing years, comes and goes and before we know it will have swiftly passed into history, let us pause and think, is our life safe in the hands of Jesus. Should God, in this next year deem our physical life to have run its course, when it ends may we not perish but have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. John 3;16.

As 2022 begins may each of us rejoice in that assurance.


