Letter to the Fellowship

"Passion for Christ"

Just a couple of weeks ago, we celebrated the most joyous event of history, the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Just before the Holy Week.

I believe this is the good news about the good news! The good news is actually about the fact that Jesus Christ died for all mankind. Some people don't want to get involved in any kind of Christian service and really, it's just a lack of passion for Christ!

SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

I think it's safe to say that the common cold is back! I know so many people, ourselves included, who've had a non-Covid infection during the past few weeks. It's a timely reminder that although we shut ourselves off from the outside and each other for two years to avoid catching Covid, in doing so

very few had the common cold either; but it didn't die off through lack of hosts and has resumed its place in our communities once again.

Sometimes our faith-life can be like that too. We can cut ourselves off from the Lord - missing out daily devotions or corporate worship can do that - and our church family and that ends up perceiving God to be very distant or even non-existent. But if we open ourselves up to worship and fellowship, we realise He's still there ready to become our life-strength once again. How wonderful would it be if a tide of faith let rip through our communities like Covid did, and like the common cold is now? In today's parlance, let's make Jesus go viral.

The Lent course concluded just before Easter - this was a valuable time of considering our relationships to God, to one another and across society. The twice a month Bible Study is moving on to look at The Acts of the Apostles - everyone is welcome to join either in the vestry or from home via Zoom.

At worship, the month started with a visit from John Amos and the story from John's gospel of Mary pouring an expensive bottle of perfume over Jesus' feet in a spontaneous outpouring of love. Our Minister, Sohail was with us for all of the Holy Week and Easter services and it was good to hear the familiar narratives and recall their purpose and end result Christ is Risen! Alleluia! Thank you to everyone who contributed eggs for our Foodbank collection. Sohail took a break on the fourth Sunday of the month when our worship was led for us by Roger Brett (and since I am writing this in advance, I am not going to predict his theme!)

You may recall that during Advent we began to create podcasts audio reflections on the internet, available for anyone to listen. So far, we have concentrated on important dates in the Christian calendar and used mainly other people's materials with permissions. although sourcing materials and getting authority is often guite time consuming. Around half a dozen of us are participating so far, and thanks go to Roger for co-ordinating and uploading our recordings. This is an outreach with great potential and ideally, we would do something weekly, with original reflections and a larger variety of voices. So, if a thought strikes you (and I find this tangent often happens during quiet devotional time) do get it on paper while it's still fresh in your mind and if you would like help articulating it, that can be given too. Then pick up a recording device (every smart phone has one) and speak. You may want to practice a few times. but don't worry - the occasional hesitation makes it more authentic. On the other hand, if you would prefer to read someone else's work. do speak to Roger.

During our discussion on church life at the Annual General Meeting, the question was raised as to whether Thursday evenings were still the most appropriate time for church meetings to take place and how we might encourage more church members to participate in the rights and responsibilities of membership. We have in the past held a church meeting after Sunday worship but a fair number of people were unable to stay due to family commitments. So as an experiment, our May church meeting will take place on Sunday 29th May starting at 10.30 a.m. with a short act of worship (extended opening devotions) - Sohail has given up his 5th Sunday off to be with us, so do please do your best to be there. And if you are a regular worshipper but not a church member, you are very welcome to attend and contribute to discussions. There may be a matter requiring a vote of church members but often this is not the case.

Plans are under way for our "street party" on 3rd June to celebrate our Queen's Platinum Jubilee and invitations are being distributed throughout the neighbourhood. Please take a flyer for your friends and neighbours too. Val Mead has offered to oversee catering - very brave of her since we cannot predict numbers - and if you have offered, or can offer, to contribute please do speak to her to see what is needed.

The Synod Big Day Out takes place at Trinity Park Ipswich on 16th July. It is intended to book a coach from The Cornerstone which we can make available free thanks to a legacy - information and booking forms are available in the foyer for those wishing to travel on the coach only. Jesus Christ, our daysman

If you haven't yet read Job chapter 9, as I suggested last month, it would help to read it this month and discover Job's desperate need for a 'daysman', (verse 33. KJV) or mediator (NIV),

arbiter, someone to go between him and God and speak on our behalf, because he realized the total impossibility of any human to plead his cause with a Just and Holy God. We all stand under a just condemnation! *No one will be declared righteous in God's sight by the works of the law*, Romans 3:10. We cannot merit our being made right before God.

There is no one righteous, not even one;." Romans 3:10.

So, like Job, we too need a Daysman. (KJV) In OT days it was the eastern custom for a judge to lay his hands upon the heads of the two parties in a disagreement, thus emphasizing his adjudicatory capacity and his desire to render an unbiased verdict, and so bring the two parties together. Job might consider a human judge as capable of acting as an umpire upon his own claims, but no man was worthy to question the purposes of Yahweh, (God's personal name), or metaphorically, to "lay his hands upon" Him.

Happily, Paul tells us in 1 Timothy 2:5, There is one God and one mediator between God and mankind, the man Christ Jesus, who gave himself as a ransom for all people.

Jesus is more than a daysman, adjudicating between us and God, or as a mediator pleading our cause before God. No, he does both in bringing peace between us and a Holy God and makes it possible for us, by faith in his redeeming work on the cross, to enter God's presence and enter a perfect relationship with God.

In the Temple of Jesus' time there was a small chamber at the heart of the Temple called the Holy of Holies.

It was sealed off from the rest of the Temple by a special heavy ornate curtain, the thickness of a man's hand. (Approximately 4

inches or 100 mm.) to prevent anybody from entering God's Holy place.

As Jesus died on the cross, he cried out in a loud voice 'tetelestai'. John 19:29. In our versions, 'It is finished!', but more accurately 'Paid in full'. An accounting term, certifying the complete settlement of a debt! As he did so that curtain, as thick as it was, was torn, note, from top to bottom, opening access for all into God's presence. The debt of our sin before God having been paid in full by Jesus' death.

This is our Daysman - Jesus Christ.

The Ascension of Our Lord

Luke 24:50-53

When he had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands and blessed them. While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven. Then they worshipped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God.

Left Holding the Bag

He lives! He reigns! He left His beloved disciples "holding the bag".

It is a rather colloquial expression, but the fact remains that what Jesus began, the disciples were left behind to continue. At least this appears to be the case until we begin to understand that our Lord didn't really leave His disciples at all. He "parted from them" or disappeared.

He became invisible; He returned to that dimension which is near us and about us but not visible to our eyes that are designed for threedimensional landscapes.

Before He parted from His faithful followers, He left them with a commission and a promise: a commission to witness of the things they had seen and experienced, to proclaim the Gospel they had heard, and a promise that they would be fully equipped to do the job they were commanded to do. It was not in God's eternal plan that the visible Christ should try to cover all the bases by Himself. So, He "parted from them" only to invisibly, through His Spirit, indwell, empower, and carry out the purposes of His Father through the bodies and brains of men and women who would embrace His salvation and commit themselves in His service.

The disciples of Christ, after receiving the Holy Spirit, proceeded to do this very thing - most of them martyrized in the process. Thousands followed in their wake
