Rest Rejoice Refuel

Recently a number of events, personal and communal happened around me and that there are times when we lose the view on our

made me think that there are times when we lose the view on our journey and we need to remember the importance of learning to rest, to rejoice, and to refuel our souls. It is easy to forget the simple significance of this and soon find the evidence of lack of it felt deep.

Taking the time to rest, rejoice and refuel in my day has not always been my habit. Yet, I have found, through those hard life lessons, this pattern has powerful results. More importantly, it keeps my heart close to the Father, the sole source of wisdom and peace which leads me to live out faith before those I love.

Jesus is our example in all things, wouldn't you agree? Like Christ we need to rest deep in the arms of the Father's care and love so that we become people who seek Him first.

Consider the powerful paradigm He gives us in scripture so that you can meet your daily journey with grace, *Rest Rejoice Refuel*

Our worship last month was brought to us by:

- 4th June John Amos, who spoke about the Great Commission and the part we each have to play; the imperative to tell people of our relationship with Jesus, set free from the past
- 11th June Church Parade. Our Minister's theme was Jesus the Good Shepherd. However well we know each other, Jesus knows us better; just like our domestic pets come to our calling, so the sheep know the shepherd's voice and come, otherwise they might get hurt or die. Do we come to Jesus' voice calling us?
- 18th June Father's Day. Roger Brett led the service speaking about God as Heavenly Father - more than just Creator He stays involved in our lives if we let Him and is a role model for earthly fathers.
- 25th June The Cornerstone 18th Anniversary service was a Songs of Praise, with various members sharing what special hymns mean to them. Sadly, our Minister as unable to be with us due to a national URC commitment. We do thank Machrina Ejaz for co-ordinating the Bring and Share lunch that followed and Shaleem for acting as the "Heavy Lifter".

It hardly seems possible that 18 years have passed since the various church meetings took the decision to merge, but there we are - we have come of age! And must trust God for the years ahead.

We followed the service on 18th June with the annual fire drill, we are aware this is difficult for some with mobility problems, but it is necessary for us to record it has taken place and the time taken to get everyone to the muster point so thank you for your co-operation.

The Church reception desk now has a new computer - thanks to Abneer Ejaz who built it, and the issues we were experiencing with the old one are but a memory. Over the coming weeks I will be transferring the church records (kept on my home PC since the first lockdown) back to the church. Our printer/copier supplier recommended an upgrade as parts for the previous one were becoming harder to source - keeping it would have meant a substantial increase in the fees for the service contract. So ,we also have a newer (reconditioned) machine which we hope will serve our needs for several years to come. As ever, when you are using the copier, please select black and white unless colour is absolutely essential. It seems appropriate to remind everyone that if you are making copies from a copyrighted publication this MUST be recorded in the spiral bound notebook next to the machine. And if you are making copies for personal use, a donation would be appreciated (container on the side desk).

The gentlemen's toilets in the foyer have been a bit of a problem since we had the flood and installed the water shut-off valve, and had to turn off the continuous flush to the urinals. We have now installed a timer valve which will flush once every 12 hours - performance will be monitored to ensure this does not trigger the shut-off valve. Many thanks to Frank Dixon who sourced and installed this equipment.

On 22nd June some of us gathered at Hall Road cemetery with the family of Jan Fox as her body was laid to rest alongside her late husband. Sohail led a simple graveside service and those who remember Jan of old will not be surprised to hear she had left explicit instructions for the hymns and readings! Her daughter Nicole spoke movingly about her mum as carer and organiser and Sohail reminded us of the day of the Lord's coming when Jan and all believers will be resurrected with a new body. Meanwhile we take comfort in the knowledge that her soul is safe in His presence.

2023 is already half over, gone 'in a twinkling of an eye'. My own operation and recovery, coupled with Frank's unexpected brush with mortality, have been our focus. God-willing we are now fit enough to take up the challenges ahead for the rest of the year.

BEWARE A SCAM!



Whilst going about my daily business the other day, my mobile phone rang and, as I was expecting a call, I just answered.

A lady asked if I was the person she was wanting but I missed the name so I asked her who she wanted to speak to. Without hesitation she said that she had rung me to offer me a

better deal on my mobile phone contact.

She refused to tell me who she needed to speak to, just went on with the sales pitch until deciding that she was not going to get anywhere she hung up on me.

This was the second time I have received this type of call and so was aware of the scam, because it is a scam. As reported by 'Which Magazine'

Sneaky scammers target O2 customers

Watch out for fraudulent phone calls targeting O2 customers with bogus discount offers. This 'vishing' scam involves criminals attempting to gain access to your account by promising a 50% discount on your mobile phone bill. If you accept the offer, you'll receive a text message containing a one-time passcode. And if you provide this to the scammer, they can change the password on your account.

While you're on the phone, you'll receive a text from O2.

The text tells you a one-time passcode has been requested and will arrive shortly. This genuine message will have been triggered by the scammer trying to log into your account on the O2 website.

Ultimately, the scammer wants to access the account and change your password - potentially enabling them to attempt to take out contracts in your name.

The text message from O2 includes a warning stating 'if someone's calling you and asking for a code, please end the call because they do not work for O2'. While this should arouse your suspicions, the scammer will try to talk you around and claim their request is genuine.

Next, you'll receive a follow-up text containing the code. If you read it out to the fraudster, they'll be able to use it to get into your account.

O2 confirmed to Which? that it never asks customers for passcodes, passwords, Pins or bank details over the phone.

Best advice is to hang up and do not engage.
