#### Letter to the Fellowship



#### God Keeping Us On Course

I have always been interested in space travels. It is so fascinating to know how everything is planned, prepared, and then performed.

Recently, watching a space travel related programme on discovery tv, I learned something new, or maybe I never realised it before. Apparently, as a space craft sails through the vacuous beauty of the cosmos, it is complex to keep it on an exact path. Navigating in space is not for the faint hearted. When man landed on the moon on July 20th 1969, it was estimated that the lunar spacecraft had spent up to 85% of its journey off course, because of few limitations.

Once the spacecraft had left the earth's orbit, it had mostly drifted unpropelled to the moon. The fact the module successfully reached its destination was down to a set of small retro rockets, which were fired occasionally but effectively to correct the course. When a spacecraft gets off its trajectory, it must be put back on the right track.



Similarly, when we drift from our God-given path, we also need our courses corrected. The hard truth is this; in our overwhelming uncertain and distracting world, we can all unintentionally find ourselves off course.

The stark realities of life can cause us to slide in our faith, compromise with our culture or become spiritually confused amid all the noise. If we're not careful we can end up far from where we wanted to be.

Thankfully, God doesn't leave us to get lost in space. Through the power of his indwelling Holy Spirit, God helps, guides and directs us every day like a precise rocket thruster. He nudges us back onto his path, rerouting us when we've gone rogue and lovingly correcting us

when we've missed the mark. Jesus is our Mission Control, and we must choose to listen to him.

This course correction you see often feels a little like discipline. When God pushes us to change direction, it can be humbling and uncomfortable. God's discipline though is never to be feared because it is always for our benefit.

Hebrews 12:5 says this, "my child do not make light of the Lord's discipline and do not lose heart when he rebukes you because the Lord disciplines the one he loves and he chastens everyone he accepts as his son".

When God corrects your course, he's treating you as his beloved child, as your father. He's protecting your future and ensuring you don't drift towards destruction.

I wonder if you have ever reflected, where do you feel like you're drifting in your daily life? How might the Holy Spirit be trying to correct your course? Where is he nudging, convicting or rebuking you?

As you read this, take this moment to reach out for God; imagine yourself grabbing his hand, let him call you back towards safety, lean into his course correction, welcome his loving discipline.

Psalm 94:12-13 says, "blessed is the one you discipline Lord the one you teach from your law; you grant them relief from days of trouble".

As you embrace the Holy Spirit's course correction today, you'll find peace in his guiding presence. Follow his commands and he will lead you home.

May God of hope fill you to overflowing with all joy and peace by the power of his Holy Spirit today and always in all ways.

I'm writing this on a very gloomy January morning, grey and drizzle, a far cry from the crisp sunny and frosty mornings of a week ago and a sharp reminder that we can no longer rely on the seasons as we used to years ago. Frozen pipes may be a thing of the past, but our church heating system has been playing up and we have experienced a

few chilly Sunday mornings. That should be sorted by the time you read this .....

Looking back at December, I note that we managed to have the full range of Advent and Christmas festival services and family afternoon once again, and thanks to those who were involved. As you all know by now Frank did not get his surgery before Christmas as planned, as the anaesthetist was not happy for it to go ahead within a year of his heart attack. So, we are still playing the waiting game.

On the first Sunday in January we had café style worship in the foyer led by Roger. It was very different from what we are used to but did enable us to interact with each other. Do let Elders know if you enjoyed it and want to do it again. Roger also stepped in on 21st January, when Rev Celia Whitman could not come to us (we wish Geoff well as he recovers from the fall). Other services in January were led by our Minister and the Church Meeting /Induction of Elders took place on 28th.

There have been some changes to the way we do our children and youth work on Mondays, it had become impossible to engage the attention of 4 year olds and 14 year olds in the same session. We are now opening from 3.15 so families can come straight from school for refreshments - and if you want to come along and help with that or simply chat to families you are most welcome. There are then activities for 4-10 year olds from 4.00-5.15 p.m. and for 11 and over from 5.15 until 6.30 p.m. We have engaged the services of a youth worker from the Red Balloon Foundation who is proving popular with the children, and a great help with the more active parts of the sessions!

Messy Church will still be the 1<sup>st</sup> Monday of the month, with refreshments from 3.15 and the session from 4-6.30 p.m.

Lent begins on 14<sup>th</sup> February; you are invited once again to participate in the Water Aid Jars of Change Appeal, and jars will be available the preceding Sunday, to be returned to the Treasurer by Easter.

The Annual General Meeting for the year ended 31.12.23 takes place towards the end of March, and as usual, if you manage a group or session on behalf of the church, please do let me have your notes for inclusion in the Book of Reports, by 3<sup>rd</sup> March 2024. And if your group holds church funds (a kitty), your financial statement for the year ended 31.12.23 should already be with the Treasurer.

I finish on a bright note - I have just been into the garden and seen snowdrops poking through!

#### The Shetland Bus

I spent the first six years of my life in war-torn Hastings where we suffered from the left-over bomb loads from the returning German fighter bombers being dropped on us as they returned across the Channel. I have only hazy memories of events myself and I often wonder if they are real memories, or things I have been told which have become real to me over time. I do remember running into the house when we heard the dreaded Doodlebugs whining overhead with only seconds after the noise cut out before they dropped to the ground. I also remember vividly having to walk up Silverhill to School the morning after the whole of one side had been flattened, and then having one of the families billeted with us until they were rehomed. Imagine four of us, and three of them all in a Morrison shelter overnight! Quite a squash and five of us were under five.

Why that introduction? Well ever since I became old enough to take an interest, I have been fascinated with stories about the War, not so much the battles but the side stories of heroism, service and rescues that are recorded often by very ordinary folk. There is an excellent book called The War Remembered, a collated series of stories written by the people concerned later in their lives. It is one such story, not from that book but remembered in the television series Shetland.

Very early in 1940 Norway was invaded by Germany. The country was very unprepared for the invasion and it soon fell to the invaders. King Haakon, his family and government came to live in exile and relative safety in London. Thousands of Norwegians also left their homes, many of them coming across the North Sea to make their new home in Shetland. They travelled in small fishing boats they had used in their working lives back home. Their one aim was to restore a free Norway.

In Norway a large disgruntled group formed pockets of resistance but to be effective they needed leaders, weapons and ammunition. They needed to be taught how to become saboteurs with skills to match their aims. Winston Churchill set up a special Operations unit to work behind enemy lines with the resistance groups, teaching them how to evade capture and work on the acts of sabotage as effectively as possible. The SOE became very important as the war went on but here were the early beginnings.

They needed a regular route of movement of the forces between Britain and Norway, which could also be used to evacuate refugees and fugitives. The "Shetland Bus" was conceived and became the way people and materials were moved around between the two countries.

The "Shetlandsbussene" was the nickname given to the SOE group that made a permanent link between Mainland Shetland and German Occupied Norway from 1941 to the surrender of Nazi Germany in 1945 on the 8th of May. The name of the group changed over the five years but in 1943 it became officially part of the Norwegian Navy. At the start it was operated by modified fishing boats carrying machine guns disguised as oil tanks on the decks. Losses were quite large and the small boats were joined by three fast and well-armed "submarine chasers" which had a top speed of the equivalent of 25mph and a cruising speed of 17mph. Over the rest of the war these ships made 116 journeys with no loss of life themselves. Crossings were made mostly at night in the pitch dark, without lights and in winter. This meant that passengers and crew had to endure very heavy North Sea conditions in the dark, and the constant threat of discovery by the German aircraft and patrol boats.

The main crews were volunteer young Norwegian fishermen prepared to take the risk. These boats were involved in two-way traffic, taking weapons, machinery, radios and necessary supplies from Britain to Norway and returning with folk who had to escape Norway for one reason or another, or who were needed in Shetland for military reasons. Their base headquarters were firstly in Kergard, and then at Lunna, before moving to Scalloway in Shetland in 1942.

Scalloway quickly became home to the crew and these brave young men were taken to the hearts of the Shetlanders and there is, to this day, a close relationship between the communities on both sides of the North Sea, with many families linked through marriage and their descendants forming links never to be broken. 500 tonnes of goods were transported and the action of the Shetland Bus tied 300,000 German troops down in Norway trying to beat the subterfuge the saboteurs created

In Scalloway today there is a museum devoted to the project and the leadership and bravery of those men recognised by the Norwegian and British Governments.

There were several outstanding names which are there to tell the tale. One such is Leif Andreas Larsen, called Shetland Larsen, with his own statue in Bergen. In all he made 52 trips to Norway and became the most highly decorated Allied naval officer of the Second World War. He was born in Bergen and joined the Norwegian volunteers in the Finnish Winter War. Soon after the war with Finland ended, the German invasion came and Larsen joined the Norwegian volunteers under the auspices of the Shetland Bus. He came over and trained in Shetland, with his first tour in 1941. He became a crewman on the submarine chaser Hessa, and when that one went in for repair ,he was given charge of another called the Vigra. Staying in Shetland after the war, and he and his wife Christine had three daughters.

If this has whetted your appetite to find more, there is a book called 'The Shetland Bus Man' written by one of Larsen's crew Kare Iverson. Iverson had originally left Norway in the early days of the project having been discovered by the Germans in his saboteur days.
