Letter to the Fellowship



Beyond Easter

The date of Easter for 2024 has come and it is gone. The Easter eggs in our yearly hunt have been eaten. The Easter lilies are beginning to wilt

and will soon be discarded.

But the message of Easter lives on. The things we associate with Easter may have passed on, but the meaning of the holiday (Holy Day) is forever present for those whose lives have been touched by the spiritual impact of its story on daily life.

There is no day in the calendar year that has a greater impact on the quality of life for everyone than the power of the Easter event. For it is in the historical account that we find the continuing life of One whose teachings affect humankind's best hope for a meaningful life.

For committed followers of Christ, Easter Sunday is more than a special day on the calendar – it represents a celebration of the centre of our spiritual universe. If the story of Easter is not valid, then our faith is not valid. Our message is incomplete without the exclamation point of the resurrection of Christ. No, our message is empty. A martyr's death has power to inspire, but it does not have the power to save.

It is interesting that the government-approved church in the largest country in East Asia can preach the Bible except for the resurrection and the second coming of Christ. The atheistic government understands that the Gospel is empty and incomplete without the Easter message.

But what if Easter Sunday had been devoid of the resurrection truth? Would there have been a reason for Christians to meet? I fear that we handle holy truth so much we may miss its significance. Christianity is

an Easter religion. Paul was very clear, no resurrection, no faith - at all!

As you reflect on the joy of Easter and the powerful truth you heard declared, let this glorious message sink deep in your soul. Jesus has conquered death. Because He lives, we will live also throughout eternity. But greater still we will not just live, but we will experience eternity in Heaven with all its glory.

But there is more! Our celebration on Easter Sunday was an affirmation that the Saviour will return as the Lord of Lords. He will place His enemies as a footstool under His feet. The evil of this world will crash and burn into the lake of fire. The crucified Lamb will return as the conquering King of Kings.

I believe the crowds gather on Easter because deep inside there is a longing for the resurrection message to be true. Those who nonchalantly enter the worship centre to satisfy the nagging of others or who decide to give God one day a year endure the worship, but deep inside, I believe they hope the story is true.

The message cannot be handled casually. There is a truth that demands response. I fear "church members" who pay their dues on Easter have a deep misunderstanding of the Easter reality. Christ did not die and rise on the third day for casual belief or acceptance. He died to bring radical change in the lives of all who would embrace the resurrection message through repentance and faith. Christ has no interest in indifferent church membership or faith. He demands a commitment that requires death to self and resurrection to new life.

Is the Easter season behind us? It is never over so long as we celebrate His ongoing messages of hope, accountability, and love. Easter is not just a date on the calendar, but rather it is a call for responsible action, positive attitudes, and an awakening spirit that we are alive.

May we continue not only to celebrate Easter beyond Easter, but also like the early church share it's message willingly and boldly.

May God help us to do that. Amen.

to plan a big celebration, but we hope to 'do something' later in the year. I'm not holding my breath, but we are told Frank's surgery will be on 4^{th} April.


I heard from our friend (and former Bournemouth Park member) Alan Barnes that he is finally retiring after 42 years of service in Blackburn. Yes it was that long ago that Alan and Jenny departed our church at Chelmsford Avenue, to be Superintendent at the Blackburn Ragged School, which he subsequently led into the URC - it is now known as Kingsway URC and Alan has also had responsibility for Woodlands URC for several years. These two churches are now embedded in the East Lancashire Missional Partnership. One might say that Alan was a pioneer - Local Lay Leaders are becoming a regular feature in the URC, sometimes serving a church alone, or a group as part of a team ministry, but I don't think they were around back then. We do wish Alan well as he adjusts to a slower pace! Or finds something else to fill his time.

At the beginning of March we gathered to celebrate the life of Geof Whitman, husband of our former Minister Celia, with the funeral and thanksgiving services being led by Rev. Dr Jim Tarrant. Our Sunday Services were led by Roger Brett on 3rd about the Ten Commandments, and on 17th about the New Covenant - a promise which is kept unlike election manifestos. Sohail led our services on 10th March - Church Parade and Mothering Sunday speaking of the importance of obedience to one's parents, and 24th Palm Sunday and Communion. By the time this magazine is published Sohail will also have led our Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter services.

At the Annual General Meeting for 2023 held on 24th March 2024, we had an opportunity to thank Joan Harvey for her many years of service as flower secretary, as she retired from that role. I understand there

has been a volunteer to assist Val Mead to continue presenting flower arrangements Sunday by Sunday. If you wish to contribute to the church flowers there is a list on the foyer notice board, or alternatively you can give cash to Val.

After the AGM formalities, we spent a short while considering the proposed Mission Partnership for our area. The current situation is:



- The 6 churches will be scoped for 2 FT Ministers
- Andrew Birch retires 2026. No vacancy will be declared
- Sohail has intimated that when Machrina finishes training they are likely to move; this will create one vacancy c.2027
- We do not yet know if/how long Naomi will remain at Rayleigh/Bridgwater
- The 3 current ministers will meet shortly
- It is expected that Elders or representatives from the 6 churches will meet for preliminary discussions -possibly alongside someone from the Synod office.

Synod has stated it does not wish to be prescriptive as to how the proposed MP will work but has been asked to provide a presentation of hypothetical scenarios, which could assist in developing a plan for our 6 churches. I'm sure you will have questions and/or misgivings about the future, so please do speak to Sohail, myself or Roger. We are in many ways better placed than other areas which have the added dimension of LEPs to think about, and indeed the above mentions East Lancashire Missional Partnership which is 10 churches! We must think of this proposal as a new challenge for our denomination and approach it with prayer and trust in the Holy Spirit to guide our thoughts and deliberations.

The life and witness of Charlotte Elizabeth Tonna

This last month I have watched two seemingly unrelated programmes on the television. They were both mini-series, telling the stories of workers in industries on which we relied, and still rely quite heavily.

I expect a lot of you watched the one, the tale of Mr Bates versus the Post Office. which brought back into the forefront of our news how the scandal of the Horizons computer systems devastated the lives of hundreds of postmasters and postmistresses as they found themselves trying to balance the books week on week. I could hardly take it in that Fujitsu are still running the computer systems for the Post Office to this day. Do we never learn!

However, this leads me to thinking that there is nothing new and the fight for justice brought to the public eye by media of one sort or another, and having more effect than any number of meetings, has been a long established fact of life.

So, this month, I will tell you about Charlotte Tonna born in Norwich in 1790, the daughter of Revd Michael Browne, vicar of St Giles church, and his wife Charlotte. There were at least two children, as we hear about a brother and there may have been more. As a young girl Charlotte showed a strong will and a great imagination, and together with an insatiable quest for learning, set her on a path in life not open to many ladies in those times. At the age of six she asked her uncle to teach her French and after reading about Martyrs when she was eight asked her father if she could be one too!

When Charlotte was 23 she married Captain George Phelan of the 60th regiment. Phelan was not a good man and the marriage was not a happy one with Charlotte suffering mental and physical abuse at the hands of Phelan. She was however very loyal to her marriage vows and refused all entreaties of her friends to report the man and leave him. They lived in Kilkenny in Ireland on the estate owned by Phelan. Life was made so unbearable for her that Charlotte did leave the marriage and she made her friends promise to destroy all correspondence between them after her death, still maintaining the facts were to be kept out of public view such was her strength of belief in her yows.

When her father died, Charlotte took to writing to support her mother and after leaving Phelan she went to live with her brother, Captain John Browne in Clifton. Sadly, John died in a boating accident two years later and Charlotte took over the household including the care of his two sons.



Her writing career began to expand and she began to write books for children, introducing them to the natural world through the real life stories of birds and animals. There were works about Bees, Swans, a Wasp and a Hen and her chicks. She wrote under the pen name of Charlotte Elizabeth to stop Phelan getting the money she earned from her writing.

By far her most popular books were about the world she saw around her. After she took over John's household she moved first to Sandhurst, and then to London. It was the conditions that she saw working people living in here that set her on her quest to let the middle and upper classes of society hear, and in prose see, the conditions they shut their eyes and ears to around them every day.

The other series I watched was The Mill, all about 19th century working conditions in the cotton mills, particularly for children, some as young as six who crawled in and out around the working looms collecting up the cotton waste that would otherwise clog and stop the workings. Dangerous and often maiming and even threatening lives of these children from the poorest of families where every penny earned helped put the sparsest of food on the table.

I am sure you all know the story by Hans Christian Anderson, The Little Matchgirl, and the conditions in the match factories of the East End. (Whoever would have thought that that area would, in the 21st century, be a highly sought after place to live with some of the highest prices for housing in the capital)

Those were the conditions that Charlotte brought into the public eye, through her writing. Her book "The Wrongs of Women" describing the conditions at work and then at home, to which they returned when the working twelve or fourteen hour day was over. Charlotte high-lighted

the long hours, very poor pay, lack of food and sanitation in four volumes in 1843 and 1844.

Another of her books was "Helen Fleetwood a tale of the factories" which was serialised in the Christian Ladies Magazine between 1839 and 1841. This triggered a huge outcry among these gentile lady readers and, as a result of Charlotte's writing, they helped to gather the support needed to pass the London Factory Act in the mid 1840's. This changed the working life for children, reduced the working hours and started to bring in fairer pay.

Captain Phelan died in Dublin in 1837 and despite his treatment of her, she took on the care of his mother and sister.

She married again in 1841 to Lewis Hipolatus Joseph Tonna, a very happy marriage in her own words describing him as an excellent husband. He too was a writer and after Charlotte died in 1846 from cancer he wrote a memoir celebrating Charlotte's life.
