## Letter to the Fellowship Our Goal in Life



As I write this piece, most of the world is either busy watching Cricket 20/20 world cup or waiting patiently for the Euros 24 football tournament's last 16 round to start.

Not only that, we are also having Olympics 24 in France next month. Again, the whole world seems to be getting ready for this prestigious sporting event and talking about their favourite athletes achieving the top prizes; gold medal in their respective events.

Different TV ads from different countries are showing athletes setting their personal goals for the Olympics. They are not only working hard to prepare themselves to set these goals but also planning how to achieve them. Some of them have been preparing themselves for months if not years and most of them, if not all, dream about standing at the podium waiting for their winning medals around their necks.

With all this in mind, I would like us all to ask ourselves a question: "Do we have any goals for our life?" "Do we know what direction we are headed in life?" "Do we have a vision of where we want to be in 1 year? 5 years? Or 20 years?"

In one of my favourite passages from the Bible, Apostle Paul declares "*I have fought a good fight, I have finished the race; I have kept the faith*".

The first example of the spiritual life we find in Paul's example is to fight a good fight. He said, "Fight the good fight, and "NOT fight every fight." Sometimes we invest most of our lives in battles that will have no eternal significance.

Trying to save the earth, a local charity or spotted horn owls may be good but there is no eternal significance. When I was in Bible College, we would love to debate theological issues that have been undecided for years. But we thought even though C.H. Spurgeon, Martin Luther, Matthew Henry or George Barnes couldn't figure it out, we certainly could. "Fight the good fight."

I believe every Christian has a purpose in life. Using Paul's metaphor, every Christian has a course to run. We are all given a different fight to fight and a course to run. As Christians, we don't want to just start well. We want to end well!

In order to fight the good fight and to finish the race, we need to be faithful to God. And like Paul, to be faithful to God for the duration of our Christian life. When the last fight has been fought and the last leg of the race run, our goal should



be to be able to say, *"I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course and I have kept the faith."*

*"<sup>13</sup> Brothers and sisters, I [we] do not consider myself [ourselves] yet to have taken hold of it. But one thing I [we] do: Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, <sup>14</sup> I [we] press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me [us] heavenward in Christ Jesus." Philippians 3: 13 - 14*

### **MISSION PARTNERSHIP**

Our designated Mission Partnership consists of the URC congregations at Bridgwater Drive, Christ Church Rayleigh, Hadleigh, Kings Road, Southchurch Park and The Cornerstone. The group has been prescribed by Synod, and it is for us to work out how this arrangement will develop. In theory it should be easy enough as we have no LEPs to take into account, and with the recent ill-health retirement of Rev. Andrew Birch, we currently have the allotted two stipendiary Ministers.

There is no suggestion that churches should merge (unless they want to) rather that the partnership should be one of resource sharing, starting with the Ministers. both of whom will take on additional responsibility. Rev. Geoff Wright - a retired non-stipendiary, has agreed to minister at Kings Road for as long as his own health permits, and Rev. Sohail Ejaz and Rev. Naomi Young-Roddas will take on Hadleigh - details to be worked out. In due course it may be that matters like Bible study, accounts, premises maintenance and bookings, even the Secretary(!) will be a shared resource and future meetings will consider these matters.

It was with this knowledge that the first meeting of Elders took place, with a representative from each church describing their regular church life - in a sense a getting to know you session. It was interesting to hear about our similarities and differences, particularly on issues like

LGBTQ+. Of particular note is Hadleigh's hosting of the Art Ministry catering to many disabled people of the area - a valuable service which they are keen to see continue.

There are matters upon which Synod leadership is going to be necessary, none so important as the Call of a new Minister who would have to be accepted by all six churches. (No, I'm not looking forward to minuting that meeting!)

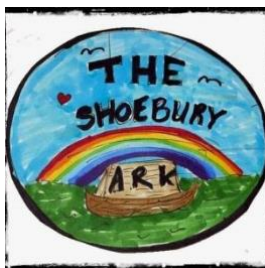

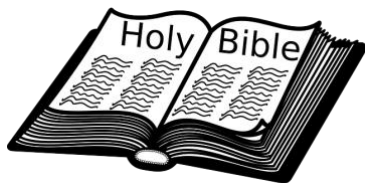


Collection point - Grey trug at Reception Desk

## Stella Carr 1939- 2024

Our dear friend and member (since 1973) Stella, passed away, peacefully, on 24<sup>th</sup> May 2024. Her funeral took place in the full Small Chapel, at Southend Crematorium, on 25<sup>th</sup> June at 10.30am.

There follows here an extract of what was read at her funeral and we are grateful for permission to print it in this magazine.

Stella was born in December 1939 at the family home in Beckenham, Kent to Albert and Winnifred Wilson. she had an older brother, Denny and an older sister, Freda. A few years later the family welcomed two more children - Stella's younger brother, David and younger sister, Vera.

Stella attended Marian Vian (pronounced vine) Infants, Junior & Secondary Schools in Elmer's End, Kent and she always enjoyed school and participated in many sports.

On leaving school at 15, she went straight into work as a filing clerk in a local office and after 2 years applied to work as a typist in London. She recounted the story many times of not actually being qualified, but won the company over, got the job and picked up the typing skills very quickly!

In 1955 she met her future husband Tony, at a dance in Catford, Kent. (He was in the RAF and stationed at nearby Kidbrooke,). Their first date was at the local cinema, they dated for 2 years. Tony proposed on Christmas Eve 1957 and they married in October 1960 at Elmer's End Congregational Church. The reception was at Stella's family home, and they moved to Essex immediately after the wedding - they could not afford a honeymoon.

Their first home together was in Leigh on Sea and started their family in 1962. David was born in 1965, Suzanne was born in their flat near Southend seafront and in 1967 they moved to Hamstel Road. This was their family home where Stella and Tony stayed for the rest of their lives and, in 1970 they had Lisa who completed their family.

In the early 1980's, both David and Suzanne started dating and in 1985 they both married, Suzanne married Chris in May and David married Anna in August - a busy year!

Tony fell ill in 1992 and Stella went with him to his many hospital appointments and cared for him at home. During this time their younger daughter Lisa married Mawdon in July 1993 and Tony sadly passed away in 1995.

Life on her own after Tony passed was difficult but after a while Stella began to enjoy life again. She joined with her friends and relatives on day trips and spent time with her ever growing family, including six grandchildren, Charlie, Jonny, Jade, Toni-Ellen, Kayleigh and Casey. who she loved very much.

Stella also had 6 great grandchildren, Frankie, Rhylei, Marley, Reiss, Ollie and Ella to who she was known as GG.

Back in 1968, not long after Stella & Tony moved to Hamstel Road, she was introduced to Cliff Town Congregational Church (later URC) by her neighbour, Mrs Bryant (known as 'Nanny Bryant' to the family).

She was a quiet Christian lady who became a regular worshipper and David, Suzanne and Lisa regularly attended Sunday School. Stella became a member of Cliff Town in 1973 and this continued until that church merged with 3 other local United Reformed to become The Cornerstone. There, she continued worshipping regularly, also enjoying the Tuesday morning coffee, crafting and the fellowship group. She was a regular attendee of Sunday services until the covid pandemic in 2020.

Over the years Stella faced various health issues, endured cancer 5 times but had always come back fighting and so continued to live a full life into her 80th year. It was only during the covid pandemic, in 2020, that the family noticed her memory and behaviour was a little 'out of character' and Alzheimers was diagnosed, in 2022.

The family cared for Stella in her own home until January this year when she moved into residential care at Crowstone House. Although Stella's time there was only for a few short months, the family are very grateful to all the staff for the love and respect shown to their mum

during this difficult time and would also like to acknowledge the support given to them by the whole team at Crowstone.

The family would like to thank everyone for their kind words and thoughts at this very sad time and for coming to say goodbye to their beloved Mum.

**We finish with a poem that Suzanne, Lisa and David feel sums up the last couple of years of their mum's life...**

When God saw you getting tired  
and a cure was not to be  
He wrapped his arms around you  
and whispered, 'come with me'.

You didn't deserve what you went through

## Sabine Baring-Gould 1834-1924

Born 28<sup>th</sup> January 1834 in St Sidwells, Exeter  
Died 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1924 in Lewtrenchard, Devon

He was an Anglican Priest, hagiographer, antiquarian, novelist, folk song collector and eclectic scholar.

Hymn writers appear on screens and books in churches when their hymns are used but there is no life story telling where and what they did.

This Devonian man was a writer of many subjects over his lifetime in Devon and East Mersea. He hated his decade at St Edmunds in Essex in 1870s due to the cold weather but he wrote 'Mehalah', a Gothic classic, there along with 80 pieces, sermons, stories and folk pieces. After his Father's death in 1881 he returned to Devon where 100 novels plus followed, with more non-fiction work as well.

This Victorian man wrote ghost stories, myths, legends and the first English printed Vampire story. This was before the 1897 release of Dracula by the author Bram Stoker.

An interesting fact - He sung like a bell and wrote "Now The Day Is Over" ideally for the church bells in St Edmunds.

A stylish fashion dresser of the time, he spoke Icelandic and 5 other languages. He was also a Vicar who as a Curate in Yorkshire wrote "Onward Christian Soldiers" for a children's festival. His many hymns and writing of books still appear somewhere today.

Josh Widdicombe (comedian and presenter) is a descendant of his.
