Reflections by an Elder

This month we welcome some thoughts from Vic Crowhurst.

As I sit here and dictate this piece, I'm absolutely amazed at the technology that writes this out for me without me having to use my hands.



God bless the innovators and designers of this dictation for computer technology. As many of you know, I have not had it easy this last six months and I still don't know what exactly is wrong with me. However, I'm not complaining because God has always been good to me.

I always wanted to be a doctor from an early age and was inspired by the Jungle Doctor books written by Dr Paul White. He was a missionary in the former Tanganyika, in Africa, and served as a GP, surgeon and missionary there for many years. He wrote 10 to 12 books that I could read and later my parents took me first to the zoo in London, and then to Westminster Central Hall to hear the reports of missionaries around the world.

This experience encouraged me against the odds, to apply to go to a medical school in Whitechapel and although it took me a little more time than expected. I qualified in 1976, being married by then and with our first child on its way. So, instead of going abroad, I started to serve as a GP in Ilford and then in Westcliff after that.

But, being of a rebellious nature, I semi-finished my career in 2005 in Westcliff whilst still in practice as a GP. I took up a secondary career as a commercially endorsed first mate sailing with 12 teenagers in the Baltic Sea during the summer and had the opportunity to sail for seven years with these groups of Scouts and others. Some of them well-to-do but some of them

quite literally like many around us in Southend, without a bean to spend but all very lovable.

Due to the many experiences, I had of sailing with them, and the great times we had together, I think that even being kind to people on a boat spreads the word of God in a practical way.

I had to retire for the third time (now who gets to be so lucky as retiring three times?) when I had the diagnosis of prostate cancer and all that that entails. This meant that I was able to be back in the church community that I love and am going to try to serve God now by doing an occasional service.

Although we are small in number, we are great in strength and I try to take every opportunity to talk to people in the high street giving out tracts. I even spoke to somebody in Morley's car park the other week and he is seeking a church near the Porters' area as he gives out tracts in the High Street. He is a believer, but he doesn't yet have a base to work from. I suggested that he comes along one Sunday morning, enjoys a service, has coffee afterwards and a chat to people. We are welcoming and I'm sure will give Andy (I think that's his name I'm terrible now at remembering things) a very warm welcome and it would be so nice if this was to become his spiritual home.

I'm talking on 24 August about the prophet Jeremiah and a couple of my friends promised to come that day and listen to me and possibly give me a critique. I did preach many years ago when I was teenager in the hall at Leytonstone but I do tend to ramble on a bit. I've really got to refine what am going to say: write it all down and then just do it! I know the Holy Spirit will guide me; your thoughts and prayers will also sustain me.

Please enjoy the next couple of months. It might be hot, but it might be like today as I write this after rain last night that has given a coolness to the air which is refreshing.

We should always thank God that whatever He sends is to our benefit.


It has been a June of contrasts weatherwise. As I write, we have just had the hottest weekend of the year so far, but the month started off quite dull with high winds.

The day after our return was Pentecost Sunday, which was also Church Parade. Neil Keeble led our worship incorporating a number of his magic tricks which delighted those present (a number of children asked him 'how?' but of course he is not giving anything away) Afterwards a number of folk stayed for a buffet lunch (and thanks to everyone that provided sandwiches) and Pentecost themed cake (thanks Ann they were brilliant) and a time of themed crafts and games.



I had the privilege of leading the service on Trinity Sunday and Father's Day when gifts of handkerchiefs were distributed to our menfolk. Thank you to everyone who participated.

During the month, we have both had a number of medical appointments in Southend and London and consider ourselves fortunate to have a billet in Maida Vale to make the latter a bit easier. We also attended Dorothy's very first Sports Day – she seems to be a reluctant athlete like her mother and grandmother!

I was absent on 22nd June, the church's 20th (China) anniversary which was led by Roger Brett – I understand there was some creativity with clay models, and the service was followed by another delicious cake made by Ann Thorp. I was, in fact away, at the triennial Messy Church International Conference at High Leigh, which involved around a dozen nations and it was good to hear how other people do things. I remain keen to reintroduce a regular Messy Church once helper numbers allow – and we are not the only church in our current situation, focussing on major events and festivals because a regular monthly event is not practical. There were a number of workshops and key speakers and this time the emphasis intergenerational worship. This is slightly different to our traditional allage worship; the idea being that all ages learn together with and from each other. Dr Sam Richards (head of Children and Youth Work in the URC) has long been a proponent of intergenerational church - see https://www.reform-February 2018 Reform magazine.co.uk/2018/01/walking-together-intergenerational-church/ and is part of the ecumenical group Intergenerate UK. She has also made a video which can be found on YouTube. The worship sessions at the conference were led by Sam and Sara Hargreaves, https://engageworship.org/, who also shared some techniques to include younger children or people with learning difficulties in the singing of hymns and worship songs - for example signing (BSL or Makaton) or the addition of a chorus between hymn verses.

For Bible Study we used the "Dwelling in the Word" method, which involves reading the same passage more than once, talking with one other person about what a particular verse means taking care to listen to what the other person says; then two pairs get together and share - not what the individual themselves thinks but what they heard from the other person. There was then a time of feedback and with over

150 present the range of experiences was not surprising; so we learned that Scripture can speak to us as individuals in different ways, according to our unique situation at the time.

The conference theme passage was 1 Corinthians 12: 12-31 about the church being a body with each of us having a part to play. If I took away nothing else from the weekend it was this: it is *A* part not *ALL* parts. I think there may well be some soul-searching to be done on this in the coming weeks.

We finished with an actual Messy Church session on the theme and of course it would not be Messy Church without an action song, so do look this one up and singalong. https://youtu.be/NwJz9hJv6E0

Back home, we are about to engage with the other churches of the proposed Mission Partnership - meetings around Property and Finance and around Worship Leading, and elders are reviewing/updating our pastorate profile. There will be some interesting, and challenging, times ahead.
