Reflections by an Elder

This month we hear from Roger.

When leading worship, you reveal parts of yourself. And this is good. People prefer you to speak from personal experience. So, this piece is a bit more about me rather than follow a party line of a sermon or Worship address or even a talk at a Church Meeting.



Starting work with a local authority I had to set up and run a scheme designed to help vulnerable people, usually elderly, to stay in their own homes for longer. Modern communications, 24 hour a day contact, and response as required.

In a way it was a lonely job as I and my team were not understood by the rest of the Council. We worked with a specialised IT system, provided 24-hour cover with no excuses or gaps and no WFH, were exempt from strikes and worked over Christmas. With no internal support, I met with other managers across London and Essex in two of the many groups across the country set up by our IT supplier. Useful perhaps, but mainly they dealt with equipment issues.

More was needed and in 1992 at the annual 'Calling for Help' conference a national organisation was proposed. Its purpose would be to increase awareness of the systems, helping more people get the support that they needed in a proper way, support managers and operators with regular local meetings and training and have an input on present and future legislation.

I was involved in the discussions and on the 16th November 1994, The Association of Social Alarm Providers (ASAP) became a registered Company Limited by Guarantee and Not having a Share Capital. It had membership of 54 organisations from both manufacturers and Control Centres across both public and private sectors for the whole of the UK.

Soon ASAP had an office and staff. The local groups held regular meetings to provide support and assistance to one another. The

executive was chosen by the members of those meetings. I became London's representative along with people from Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland as well as English Counties. I joined the Training Group and the Policies Group and eventually became the National Chair for a year. Corporately we were involved with BT, RICA, the Research Institute for Consumer Affairs and the British Standards Institute among others. All in our desire to increase awareness and provide support across the board.

As for the local groups they had their own set ups. In London, for example, we had our own advertising campaign on London Bus Stops and produced a video entitled Feel Safe in Your own home.

Every one of our now 100 members provided their services differently but with monthly newsletters and regular meetings to inform and support we finally agreed some common standards across delivery, training, equipment, policies and procedures and standards. We laid down the 'What', such as answer calls within 20secs but the 'How' was down to the individual organisation.

The name changed to Telecare Services Association, I took on different Council responsibilities and left TSA in 2001 but it is still going strong with a vision to enrich, enhance and enable people's everyday lives through technology enabled care.

So now 24 years later we have proposed Mission Partnerships. Ours has the prospect of six churches all of whom aim to 'love God and others through Jesus Christ; are a body of believers who know that no single one of them is complete without the gift of salvation from the One that makes them whole; who strive together to be more like the Saviour, Jesus Christ, and to light the way for others to come to know Him.' As our website puts it.

This time I am only helping six churches move towards a common view of how and where to do 'Mission' or maybe 'Increase Awareness of God's Love", looking towards good preaching, helping and supporting across the MP in Children and Youth work, with regular meetings and communication. safeguarding, GDDPR, finance, copyright policies and procedures etc. etc.

If we managed it with 100 mostly local authorities then I am sure we can manage it with six local churches given prayerful discussion and acceptance by everyone, that their ideas are not the only ones, that others may do it better. and stopping doing something and passing over the baton is not failure, does not detract from what has gone in the past but allows continuity into the future, passing on of God's love and sacrifice for us all.



Letting go is not such a bad thing and frees people up to do something different. Jesus had a working group that He sent out in pairs, the disciples later, when left on their own, worked together to pass on the Good News. We are looking towards being a MP that provides support, makes the tasks simpler, easier and shared. Mutual benefit for all and a greater opportunity for mission.

Oh! No! I did follow the party line after all.

SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK

It is said that this has been the hottest and driest summer on record; today, as I write, it may be the exception to the rule, it's grey, cool and windy and I have one eye on the clouds that look like they could dump on my washing at any time! We may sometimes seem to be

preoccupied by the weather which often dictates how and where we spend our time; and of course how can we really appreciate a bright sunny day without experiencing the opposite?

A lot has happened since the last magazine so here are some notes to bring you up to date.

At Synod level, the Moderator is on Sabbatical and Nicola Grieves, the long-standing CYDO, has retired [at least from the Synod post-she is now a Rector in the Church of England https://barrowbenefice.org.uk/revd-nicola-grieves-has-been-appointed-as-rector-in-the-barrow-benefice/ we wish her every blessing for this new position and we await news of her replacement.

Locally, we are getting regular meetings under way across the Mission Partnership and discovering how others do things differently. I expect the momentum will increase in the coming months as we need to formalise things before a pastorate vacancy is declared when we can begin the process of seeking a new Minister. During the vacancy, Elders are able to undertake many of the normal functions of a church - baptisms, funerals etc so do please speak to Roger or myself, if there is a need. We would be particularly happy to speak with those who may be considering the privileges of full membership of the church.

Here at The Cornerstone, we have had our regular routine Sunday services and one or two not-so-regular. We were delighted that the Scout group took responsibility for the July parade service, and each section made a presentation and chose a hymn. The cub section presented a banner to the church, which can now be viewed on the notice board inside the worship space. We do thank the young people and officers for sharing their experiences and look forward to hearing more in the future.

On 17th August, our Junior Church/Pilots group took a major part in the service about the story of Joseph and his brothers. This is a very

enthusiastic group of young people and Derek, Mary and I are much encouraged their debut went so well. The service was followed by a lunch and a showing of the film "Joseph and His Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat". I'm sure we will have the opportunity to do something similar in the future. Many thanks to everyone



who contributed to the lunch spread - there was quite a bit left over as only around half the morning congregation stayed on, and this was gladly received at the St Vincent's Centre in Short Street, where those who were getting a hot evening meal could take away a little extra for later.

The Manse in Wansfell Gardens is now vacant, as Shameer and Abneer have moved into their bachelor pad. In due course we will be bringing a proposal as to what should be done with the property, meanwhile for insurance purposes we are having to make regular visits to check on things. If anyone is willing to assist with that, please let me know.

Looking forward, our Elders' Election may seem a long way off at the November Church meeting. However, it is our custom that nominations are received throughout October, and Elders will be making recommendation to the September Church meeting on the minimum number, in accordance with the church constitution. So, it is not too early to be thinking about whom you might wish to nominate. Those retiring at the end of 2025 are Clive Goodhew, Derek Goodyear and Alison Shannon, all of whom are eligible for re-election.

22nd September - 4th October is FairTrade Fortnight. I know many of us committed years ago to buying FairTrade products such as tea and coffee, but you might wish to use this particular period to try out other things - some supermarkets have a decent range these days and you can get some ideas here

The final Sunday in September will be our Harvest Festival when you are invited to bring gifts of packet or tinned goods which will be donated to the Shoebury Ark. On the previous Friday evening there will be a Fish and Chip Supper and entertainment -please sign up at the Foyer Notice Board.

Through the church's membership of the Southend Association of Voluntary Services (SAVS) we were invited to participate in Anglian Water's Just Bin It campaign, which fits nicely alongside our commitment to good stewardship of God's creation. The campaign is basically a reminder of what should or should not be flushed into our drains and there will be some publicity items for you to take and share with friends, neighbours and clubs.

On the subject of bins, many of us will be getting a suite of wheelie bins for our home rubbish. Whether we want them or not, it does present a unique opportunity to identify your home as a place where Jesus Christ is followed and could open conversations with your neighbours. A Modern Day Good Samaritan Story

It was late on Sunday evening when Paddy Walsh was knocked into the gutter by a hit and run driver. It happened on Baker Row and there weren't many people about. But perhaps help was at hand when Wayne Thompson came down the road and saw Paddy lying in a pool of blood. Wayne had recently been made redundant and was off to his weekly drinking session with his mates in the Rose and Crown. As he approached Paddy, he noticed his wallet in the inside pocket of his jacket. It contained more than enough for a good night's drinking and a few extras during the week. Wayne took it and left Paddy lying there, unconscious.

On the opposite side of the road was St Luke's Church and Canon Smith had just put on his slippers after the last service of the day and was looking forward to a relaxing evening by the fire with a good book. As he glanced out of the window he noticed Paddy on the other side of the street. He did nothing because he knew someone else would be along soon and after all, Sunday was his most tiring day and he was entitled to a bit of rest after looking after people for the other six days of the week. Yes, someone would be along soon.

Baker Row Shelter for the Homeless would shortly be opening its doors for the night and John Grime was hoping to be first in the queue and get one of the beds closest to the radiators and a bowl of soup while it was still hot. He saw Paddy, by now groaning in the gutter, and was moved to pity. Opposite was a public phone box and John went and called 999. Within a short time, the ambulance arrived and took Paddy off to hospital. He wanted to go with the ambulance but the Police needed to interview and take a statement from him down at the Police Station. It meant that he ended up last in the queue for the shelter.

For Wayne Thompson, Paddy was prey, fair game. For Canon Smith he was a nuisance and an inconvenience. For John Grime he was not only someone in need but someone who offered him a chance to serve and minister to his needs. When you are faced with vulnerable people, which of the three attitudes do you take? But more importantly, why?


