Every time we pick up a newspaper, listen to the radio and see the news on our phone or TV, these words seem to describe many things that happen in our world.


Whether it be about land, possessions, money, people, just about anything that someone else has that others want.

SECRETARY'S NOTEBOOK



As I write, we have just had the first cold snap of the season - enough to warrant getting out the ice scraper to the car in the morning, but not prolonged enough to kill off the weeds!

At the end of October, during the service led by Daniel Williams, there was an opportunity for some discussion. The feedback we heard was largely positive and maybe we will try this again. A couple of observations

- Do make sure nobody is left without someone to talk with
- When giving your group answers please wait for a microphone
- When handheld microphones are used, they need to be held no more than 4 inches from your mouth

These last two points also apply to church meetings, in order that your voice is heard by everyone, particularly those relying on the T loop.

Frank and I have spent a good deal of time 'babysitting' the various engineers for the annual round of servicing of plant and equipment. We have filled the hours with maintenance jobs and service planning. You may have noticed the newly painted car park fences; sadly there is a great deal of rubbish piled up in the alley which is damaging part of the fence, I have been speaking to councillors to see whether the local authority will remove the rubbish, without much success to date. Apparently, it is 'common land' for which the council has no responsibility. There is a possibility of a community clean up being organised, I have made it clear that we do not have vast numbers of fit and able people to join in, but we could provide refreshments.

You will also have seen that shabby areas of the premises have been repainted - this is thanks to Ann Thorp and John Warin, who have spent many hours decorating and saved the church a fortune. It is likely we may have to hire professionals to do the higher areas.

It was with sadness we received news of the passing of Shelagh Root, who was a faithful worshipper until frailty prevented her attendance. Shelagh's funeral is on 5th December at 10 am at Southend Crematorium.

Services during November were led by Ian Miller, Roger Brett and Ruth Dixon. At the Remembrance Sunday parade, crosses were distributed each bearing a name of our war dead, as a change from reading out names. Courtesy of the internet, we were able to join the 11am rite at the Whitehall Cenotaph. After the service on 16th November, we had a lunch to welcome those who have come to us during the last year and thank Ann for the catering with her team of assistants. This gave us the opportunity to explain how the URC is structured, where and how decisions are made and invite consideration of church membership. Please do come and have a word with me if you think membership is for you, so we can progress further.

- The Mission Partnership Agreement was approved

Remembrance Sunday 9th November 2025

On the 9th November 2025, The Cornerstone joined with millions of people around the world in remembering those lost during so many, many wars.

Once again I led the worship and my main address concerned the young Wrens (Women's Royal Naval Service) of WATU. This stood for Western

Approaches Tactical Unit and was set up under the direct instruction of Winston Churchill with the express, single remit to stop the U-Boat attacks on the vital convoys bring us essential war and survival equipment. The commanders of the convoy escorts had had some luck in sinking U-boats but it was not good enough.

The unit opened in 1942 and operated out of a building in Liverpool, one of the most bombed areas of the country. No suitable Navy personnel were available. Only those who were getting on a bit, set in their ways and operating on how previous wars went were offered up and were declined.

The Wren Commanding officer, Vera Laughton Mathews offered to supply suitable people and soon four Wren Officers arrived shortly followed by four ratings two of whom were only seventeen.

All were keen and eager with this important role. Round the clock working became the norm as they worked on all the available information and eventually came up with their first set of tactics which they called 'Raspberry' as in 'Blowing a Raspberry at Hitler'. Others followed and training of the naval commanders started using a war game. Over 5000 naval officers passed through the training.

Many U-boats were sunk and numerous lives were saved by the work carried out and training delivered by these young ladies. At the end of the war, they went home and said nothing having signed the Official Secrets Act.

They were not allowed to fight but they served as best they could working all-hours to save lives and ensure supplies got through.

This then was the main thrust of my Remembrance talk but it was not the most important part of the worship. Neither were my words, nor the Drum-Head set-up, nor the flags or the book of Remembrance, nor the music or the hymns, not the readings or the parading by our Scout Group. Not even the crosses handed out with the names of our war dead.

The real highlight of the worship was the poppies. Our Cub Scouts and Beaver Scouts had made some wreaths and some poppies and they brought these forward. But attached to one of our lecterns was a cascade of hand-made poppies.

Some of our fellowship stepped up when asked to provide poppies for the display on Southend Pier. When the time had come to pass them all over word reached me that they would have liked to do more so I asked that, if they wanted to, we would be able to use them on Remembrance Sunday. We received a few, then a few more and a few more until on the Tuesday before the Sunday the final bag arrived. The grand total was 96.

96 handmade poppies, made with love and memories and thankfulness for those who did not return. Same graves we know and these are shown in our Book of Remembrance, others are lost in the fields of Europe and many other battlefields.

My grateful thanks go to all who helped make this a memorable Remembrance.



The Moon by any other name – Alison Shannon

We use the name moon as a singular term because until Galileo discovered other objects circling other planets it was thought to be on its own. In 1610 he found the first of now many, many other moons orbiting the other planets, notably first Europa and IO orbiting Jupiter.

There are now, at the last count I could find, 95 of which 56 have been given names. Mercury and Venus are the only ones without moons.

Did you know that the moon can mess with your emotions? That is a supposed fact about the Full Moon. It was in the Middle Ages that scientists believed that seizures, fevers and rheumatism were all caused by the effect of the full moon. The word Lunatic directly comes from the moon root Luna and means literally Moonsick. Does the Full Moon keep you awake? Moon researcher Marie Dumat suggests that the effect of more light in the evenings could account for the research recorded elsewhere that less melatonin is produced and it takes longer to fall asleep at full moon time. Perhaps those who sleep with a blackout normally could try it and let me know!

Alongside GMT and all the other time zones we have, there is LST which is Lunar Standard Time. One Lunar year with twelve Lunar Days when each “day” is equivalent to an earth month, each “day” divided into cycles and each cycle then divides into lunar hours, minutes and seconds. Each day is named after one of the twelve astronauts who have walked on the moon’s surface. For example, Neil Armstrong stepped onto the surface on July 2nd 1969 at 2.56.15. Universal time, starting Lunar year one/ day one/cycle one in LST. Lost? Never mind, let us look at some much easier names to understand.

Looking for other names for the various stages of the moon like New, Crescent and Full, you find that each of our months has a moon name associated with it. Some of these are self-explanatory like Snow Moon in February and Cold Moon in December. Others though have gained their names from countryside life and traditions. In January the wolves of earlier times found it hard to find food, howled with hunger and the name Wolf Moon found a home. Some come from the Native American Indian stories from the nature they saw around them

at certain times of the year. The colours of the plants and flowers give us Pink Moon in April and Flower Moon in May. Then June is Strawberry Moon.

Beaver Moon in November, when they settle into their lodges for winter and hunting for their pelts stops, follows the October Hunter's Moon when they would stock their winter larders with deer and fox meat to see them through the winter months. Animal habits too give the Buck Moon when it is the rutting season and the Sturgeon Moon when the fish are abundant in August.

Drawing to a conclusion, here is one of my favourite expressions associated with the word Moon, and which I just had to find out a bit more about. Sorry, there are facts and figures again but how often have you heard the expression "Once in a Blue Moon" and if so, have you ever thought of where it came from? Definition of a Blue Moon is that it is the second Full Moon in any calendar month. February 2018 did not have a full moon but both January and March had two full moons, so by definition both had a Blue Moon. Just an extra aside,



one of those two was also a Lunar Eclipse. Blue Moons are relatively sparse in the grand scheme of things but as with all this creation wonderment, the scientists are calculating when they will be.

On the 31st May 2026 there will be the second full moon, so a Blue Moon, then on the 20th May 2027 another and yet another on the 31st December 2028. The next time we get two Blue Moons they tell us will be in 2037, when my great grandson will be 37, his mother 55 and his grandmother nearly as old as I am now!!

So much for all that about the moon, and no doubt you are all saying just as well there aren't too many Blue Moons!! Just remember what started all this - CREATION. What a wonderful God we have, all made by Him, set in the heavens as a source of light and the wonder of it has kept the scientists busy ever since Galileo and humankind, animal and plant life under its control ever since time began.

Do you believe it?

- I got my wife to help me put some posts in the ground for our new fence. I gave her the hammer and said, "When I nod my head, you hit it." I don't remember much after that!
- Headline in newspaper - Pile of Toilet Rolls collapse in Supermarket trapping customers underneath. Ambulance crew said "It looks like they've suffered from soft tissue damage"
- A hacker called me and said he had all my passwords, I got a pen and paper and said, "Thank goodness for that, what are they?"
- I bought a vinyl record yesterday called "Sound Wasps make". When I got home and played it, I said to myself, "This doesn't sound anything like wasps." Then I realised, I was playing the bee side!!
